### Frozen onions

According specialists at the Ontario There was a special family. Food Council, Ministry of gathering Friday at the home Agriculture and Food, onions can be frozen for short-term periods. Since they tend to lose flavor after 3 to 6 months. Andy Nicol of Fairview, they are best used before

> Choose mature, good quality onions for freezing. Sweet Spanish types freeze best, but any good garden variety will do.

Peel, wash and prepare onions by slicing in rings or chopping as desired. Blanch and sisters. (Sister Maisie for 11) minutes in boiling Fry of Sault Ste.
