

## Pre-natal classes at Robert Little

Walking into the Robert Little school resource centre on Wednesday evenings is like walking into a giant maternity ward.

Several pregnant women and their husbands meet at 7.30 to watch films, practice breathing exercises and talk frankly about their past labour, i.e., the pain involved, length of labor, birth control, caesareans etc. Tours of hospitals have also been conducted when apprehensive women can ask any questions they may have in their minds.

Jaci Winskill teaches the course which is put on by the Halton Regional Health Unit, in affiliation with the Acton "Y" fall programs.

Some of the women are having their first child, while others are into their second or third pregnancy. The mothers who have gone through everything before describe their feelings with the others. They tell of the pain, the joy, the emotional and physical burdens etc.

Breathing exercises are practiced so that when the woman's time comes, she will know exactly what to do and when.

### Husbands, too

While all this is going on, the husbands are taking an active part in everything. They partake in the question and answer period, assist during the breathing, watch the films, and visit the hospitals. They take part in

everything, and have some idea of what their wives are experiencing.

This is the first pre-natal class to be held in Acton and the response is good. The women are friendly with each other, understanding the other because they are going through the same thing. Con-

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## House encroaching on town-owned land

The town's solicitor the works department and planning department are going to join together to try and find a solution to the problem of an Acton resident's home encroaching onto town owned land.

Maxine Hurst, 57 Young Street, would like to sell her home but when a survey was conducted it was discovered her land is encroaching on town property.

Monday Halton Hills council agreed with Mrs. Hurst's lawyer, Ron Henry, from the firm of Braida and Valeriot, that the agreement drawn up by the town's solicitor was unsatisfactory and decided the planner should be consulted about the problem.

Last week Mr. Henry appeared before works committee and outlined the problem and suggested possible solutions.

He told the committee his client realizes her property can't squat on town-owned land and that her land encroaches on Halton Hills property both on Young Street and Peel Street.

Mr. Henry explained the problem must be solved if Mrs. Hurst is to turn over a proper title to the prospective purchaser of the home.

He noted that under the Ontario Municipal Act the town can give a resident permission to use town land and it can be handled in the form of a licence.

Mr. Henry pointed out there are no precedents for such an action in Halton Hills but the same procedure has been followed in Oakville.

He told the councillors the house is a conforming use as far as the official plan is concerned and it has stood in the same place for over 50 years.

Mr. Henry rejected the idea

of a quit claim deed and suggested the town enact a by-law allowing the new owner to squat on town property.

He suggested the town can allow owners of the home to use the town property as long as they continue to make the home a conforming use and pay for a yearly fee.

Councillor Dick Howitt suggested the town rent its property for \$1 a year.

Gary Carter, Mississauga, would like to buy the house and move to Acton.

The lawyers and planners will sit down and try to reach an agreement so the purchase of the home by Carter can go through.

## Town will take over rural cemetery

Halton Hills works committee decided last week to comply with a request from the Ashgrove Women's Institute that the town take over maintenance of the old Pioneer Cemetery, Seventh Line, as of the start of next year.

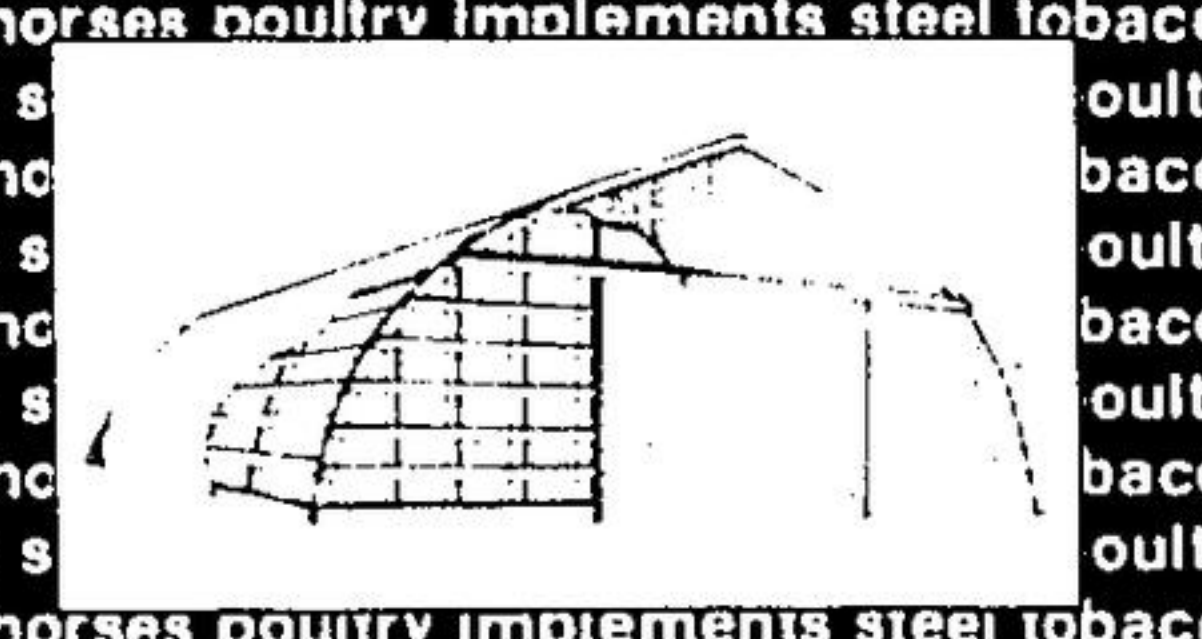
