Wolves killing sheep, council wants bounty

The problem of wolves is continuing to plague the Eramosa township council

At Monday evening s meeting, Deputy-Reeve Betty Lou Clark said she followed the suggestion made at the last meeting to ask the Wellington county council to put a bounty on wolves

It was brought to the council's attention on October 6 that wolves have been killing farmers' sheep in the area and something should be done about it.

Ms. Clark said that the county council wanted their problem put in writing instead of her felling them about it before a letter is written. She then reported back to the township council. The Deputy Reeve reported that the county said that by putting a bounty on wolves, they are encouraging farmers to keep population of sheep down, therefore making fewer claims.

Councillor Dave Masson spurted. "This is ridiculous" We want the wolves to mulkilling the farmers' animals"

Reeve Bill Adsett said that they may have problems with wolf killers from other townships cashing in on their bounties, if they are bought back to enforcement. He pointed out that the person receiving the bounty would have to sign an affidavit saving the animal was killed in the area

It was suggested by one of he members of council that the bounty be only for property owners to alleviate this potential problem.

Mr. Adsett said that the

bounty would increase the enthusiasm for people to kill the animals, which would disturb the conservationists.

Clerk Lloyd Hindley revealed that \$400 to \$500 worth of sheep have been tacked pack He said that the killed this year

Eight deaths have been confirmed by an evaluator as caused by wolves

that a wolf will attack the animal and kill it, where a dog will leave the mublated body alive, the animal left to suffer until it dies

Mr. Adsett said that the farmer only receives compensation for the dead sheep if the careass is found, and in some cases, the wolf will carry it away never to be Aroamer

Conneillor John Hewitt is concerned about the fact that the wolf is a roamer and it could be tracked 20 miles from where the killing took place. This, too, he explained. would cause a problem for bounty collectors

Mr. Masson suggested drawing up a rough draft of a by-law and if the county council doesn't accept it. the township will themselves Mr. Adsett discussed with


I flashing red light Village mail goes out
