Last week Prime Minister Trudeau announced wage and price controls in Canada. We decided to do an informal survey at Acton high school to determine staff and student feelings about the new legislation. Here is a sample of the opinions we received.

Mr. Dave Jones, science teacher feels that "there might be a lot of loopholes", while grade 10 student Harry Schupp had no comment one way or the other.

"Big companies will find a way to get out," said Fay Newman, a grade 11 student. Les Kiehl, of grade 12, agreed with her, and Student Services Advisor Sue Burns claimed "It won't work; it isn't thought out enough to work. Beating inflation in-

volves much more than controlling prices and wages."

Warren Coultrup, a grade 11 student felt the proposals were "disgusting" because "they tried it in the States and it didn't work!"

In contrast, English teacher Geoffrey Sansom feels "the proposals are worth trying, but must be in effect for at least five years, and probably will not work without some modifications."

Grade 13 student, Hjalmar Tiesenhavsen agrees with Mr. Sansom, calling the proposals "a good try."

As might be expected, our survey showed that people's reactions vary from a careful but supportive "wait-and-see attitude", to pessimism and the belief that the program will not work.
