

Halton Hills gives up fight to get back water and sewers

The town has given up its battle to have the responsibility for water and sewers transferred back from the region to Halton Hills.

Earlier this year Halton Hills council passed a resolution to petition the province to have water and sewer service responsibility returned to the municipalities and received support from only Milton, Oakville and Burlington both rejected the idea and believe they are receiving fine service for water and sewers from the region.

After this tactic failed the town decided to present a brief to Queen's Park but last week Halton Hills works committee decided to abandon the plan to present a brief but at the same time the committee thinks it has come up with a way to get around what they consider poor

service from the region. "We have been looking into this for some time now and find there just isn't any facts to use against the region in a brief. While Milton supported us in our resolution they aren't really unhappy with the way water and sewers are being handled. I don't think we should go any further on a brief. Queen's Park has made it clear, both through Darcy McKeough and John White, there is no way they will consider returning water and sewers to us so I think we are really just beating our heads against a wall," committee chairman Joe Hurst explained.

He suggested the town should now concentrate its efforts in working out some kind of arrangement with the region so water and sewer service can be handled properly and "iron out the kinks."

Hurst says residents are finding they have to run back and forth between the town and region to get work done and he believes Halton Hills should "give up this war and concentrate on the battle."

Mayor Tom Hill agreed the town should give up trying to get the responsibility for water and sewers returned and concentrate on making things work more efficiently for the town's ratepayers.

Councillor Ern Hyde agreed the town wasn't getting anywhere in its protests to the province and suggested the town should do all water and sewer connections on town streets. Halton Hills isn't happy with the region hiring private contractors to do the work of connecting water and sewer service on town streets and then not repairing the roads properly.

Engineer Robert Austin said most of the problems the town has been encountering with the region in the area of water and sewer have been solved. He noted the region would do the water and sewer work on town streets but they don't have the staff and there aren't any problems with poor work in Oakville and Burlington because the private contractors are better
