Apple day in Limehouse was Oct. 18. Fifteen cubs and one scout were out selling 3 1/2 bushels of apples. The net

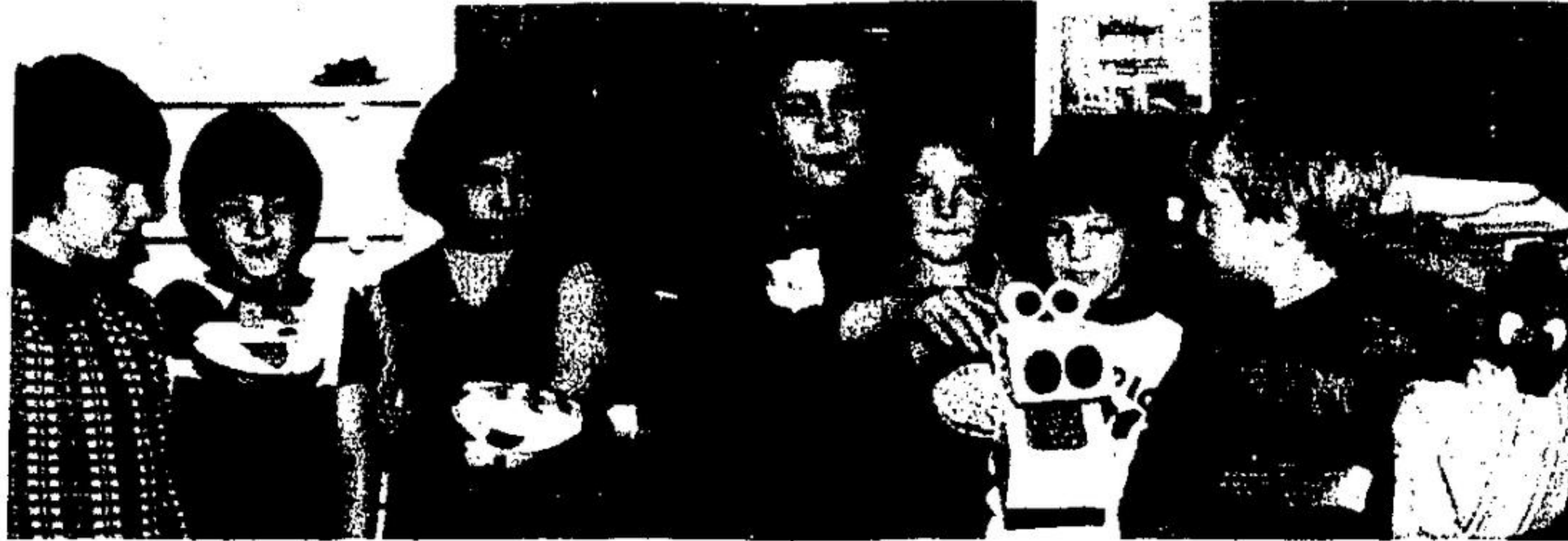

Put in curbs, gutters, but no six lane road

An error in the October 8 edition of the Free Press was pointed out yesterday (Tuesday) by Ed Stevenson, project manager of the Regional Planning and Design department of the Ministry of Transportation and Communication.

The story, entitled "Discuss construction, road to be six lanes" was inaccurate, Mr. Stevenson said. He told this paper that Hwy. Seven through Rockwood would not be widened, as the story suggests. "The existing four lanes will remain, and we are going to extend the curb and gutter from the intersection of Hwy. Seven to County Road 27, westerly to Fall St.," he said.

Mr. Stevenson continued to say that curbs and gutters would also be put in from the

Eramosa River bridge south to approximately the south limits of the village. There will be a sidewalk on the west side, he said.

This newspaper apologizes for any inconveniences or embarrassment the people in Rockwood, Mr. Stevenson and the Ministry of Transportation might have incurred due to the error.

The information came up at the October 6 meeting of the Eramosa Township council.
