The water safety rule of the week is, "Never dive into unknown waters". It's hard to understand why any person would knowingly plunge head first into water of unknown depth. But they do-in the often murky waters of oceans, lakes, rivers, ponds and quarries. Even in swimming pools, with their clear water. people are killed or paralyzed diving into them. One must look before he leaps at all times when entering a pool.

Another excellent safety precaution is to check the water depth marking and whether the water level is high or low. All supervised beaches and pools are clearly marked with the depth. In most tragic cases of death or paralysis, water safety experts are convinced that "diving error" was respon-
