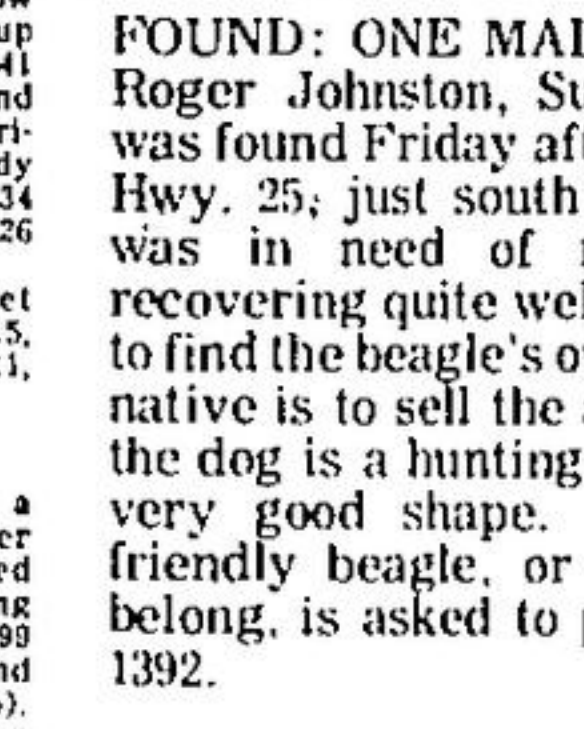
BIG FOUR
