I must admit, however, there are times when less rain and fog, and more crisp bright sunshine

would be welcome. Now's the time to have a good long look at your winter horse arrangements. If you are stabling your horse this winter be'll be in at night soon, if not now. He needs full feeding, even if there's still grass in the pasture-there's very little nutrition in it now.

It's time

November is the month for a thorough worming for all common parasites. Ask your vet. He'll recommend a method and probably test for types of worms present. Without worming, you'll waste a lot of feed.

Unless your horse has problem feet or you plan to ride on the roads all winter, have his shoes taken off so his feet can rest and grow the nailholes out over the winter.

Lencourage mine to grow a heavy coat in the late fall by leaving them out at night until November. They are out all day, every day, in the winter and I like them to have lots of woolies. They look like teddybears now. It's only in the spring I regret their long hair and complain bitterly as it sheds out in untidy hunks.

Thought so

Are your horses full of burrs? Yes, I thought so. So. are mine. Every time we go to work and clean up a mare, she looks thoroughly disgusted and goes right out to "find that nice patch of burrs again". Our horses play in a large area of bush so cutting the burdocks is impossible.

When you remove burrs, pour baby oil or mineral oil on your hands and separate the hair from the burrs. The oil protects your hands and makes the burrs slip from the hair more easily.
