A long-simmering debate surrounding Campbellville Lions club community hall project ended last week when Milton council unanimously agreed to purchase the hall. Price is listed at \$62,265.

The Campbellville Lions were guarantors of two mortgages and other outstanding debts totalling \$62,265. Club members asked the town for financial help last year.

The structure was termed an eyesore and some councillors felt that another \$15,000 to \$20,000 would have to be spent for improvements.
