\$500 to Guides for gear


Halton Hills council went along with a finance committee recommendation Monday night, to grant the Girl Guides of White Oaks area \$500 for camping equipshot deal.

Councillor Ern Hyde said he didn't want to be put in the position of opposing the Guides, but questioned the whole policy of grants. "How far do we go?" he asked as he pointed to many other worthwhile groups who could ask for grants.

Finance Chairman Harry Levy said this was a one-time grant since the Guides have no camping equipment at all. He said the Guides have no other way of raising money except by their cookie sales. He said the finance committee plans to draw up a policy covering all grants.

Councillor Roy Booth said he questioned an expert, his wife, who is assistant district commissioner. "She checked and found out we are one of the few municipalities who don't give grants on a continuing basis.


