**Motorists can see trotters**

"It's not often you see an Irishman working with Standardbreds," quips Georgetown's newest training import, John Collins, refer-

ring to the age-old adage that Irishmen and Thoroughbred horses go together. There's always room for one more, feel John Collins

and George Bolton as they try their hand at running a training stable for Standardbred trotters. As partners in Bolton & Collins Standardbred Stables, they are leasing the stable and a few acres of land from Mr. and Mrs. G. Garrett, owners of Earlesmere, the familiar country home in the Highway 7 curve just north of Georgetown.

Bolton resides in Erin and owns two of the horses. Collins describes himself as "on-the-property manager-trainer and groom." He actually lives in the tack room adjacent to the stable. "You don't see many barns with hi-fi," Collins says showing the piped stereo tape deck.

Collins worked with Thoroughbreds in Ireland and emigrated to Canada to "try something different". He began to work with Standardbreds, mostly trotters, and says he wouldn't even look at a Thoroughbred now.

"It's more of a challenge," he says. "It takes as much as two years to get a trotter ready. They're harder to work with."

He likes the "regular guys" he meets in Standardbred racing. "You don't need the money you need for Thoroughbred racing," he states.

The 10 year old stable consists of ten roomy box stalls and a wide circular gravelled aisle roomy enough for harnessing. A recent Collins-Bolton addition has been the oval sand track to the west of the barn easily visible from Highway 7. Collins feels sand is easier on a horse's feet and helps in muscling him. Four trotters are currently in the barn along with a

hunter-jumper boarder. Collins would like to see the empty stalls filled with Standardbreds or hunters. The stables' pride and joy is "Donna Lassie," a trotting mare in training. She is the granddaughter of "Star's Pride" who ran 1.57 at the age of four and won nearly \$150,000.

Collins feels a trainer must spend a lot of time with his horses.

"It takes patience," he says. "The horse can do it on his own. The day you see me with a whip, you can shoot me."

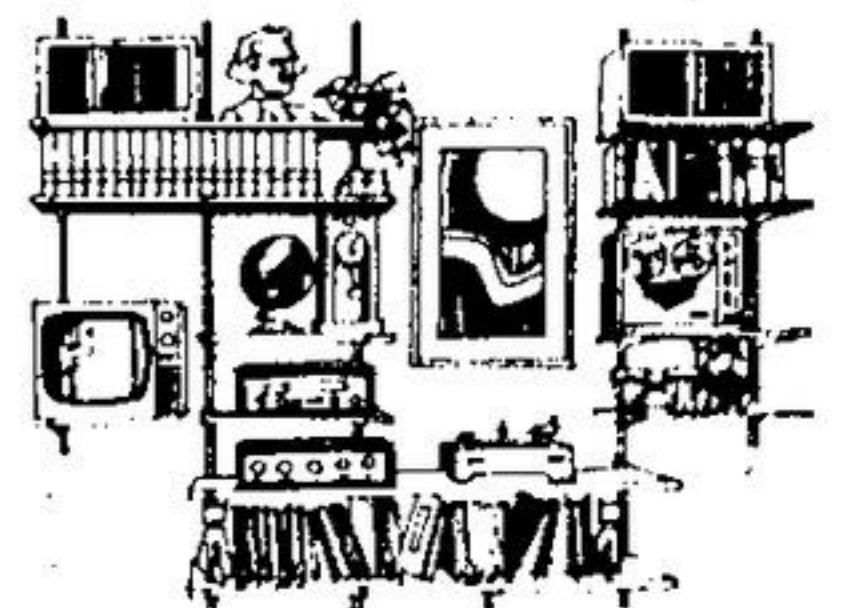

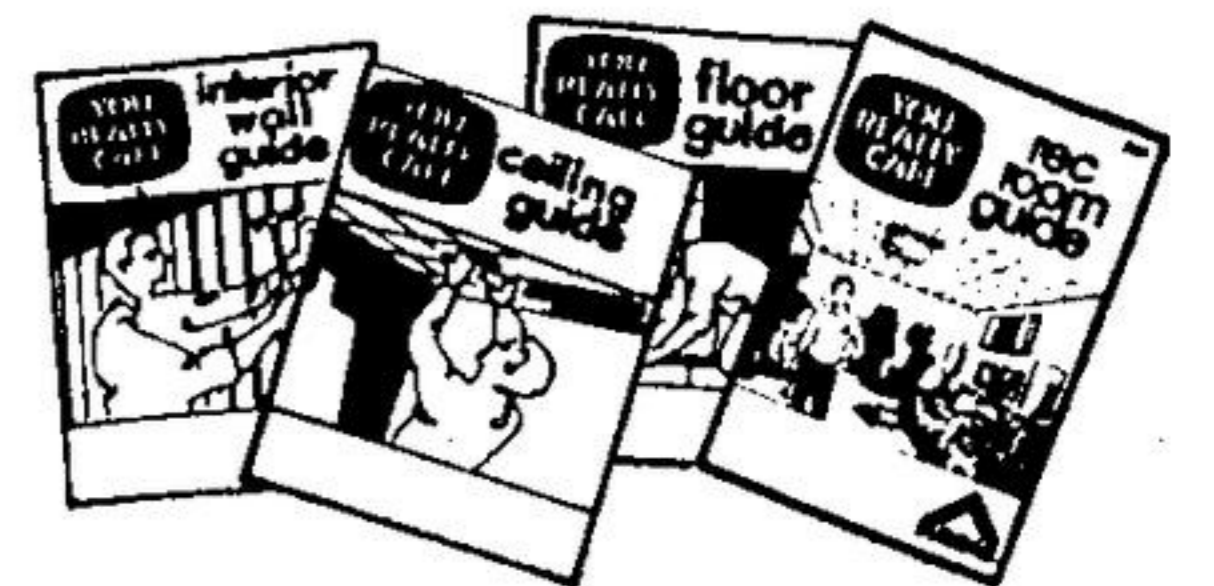
