CP Rall traffic was diverted to Canadian National's main line all week, for the violence of the impact derailed 40 of the 86 freight cars and ruined more than 300 yards of track.

Overturned freight cars lay crumpled in the marshland, and one triple-decker car carrier toaded with new GM vehicles was overturned and many of the cars damaged.

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
