Sabres sharp at home lacklustre on the road

Sabres continued their fine play at home and poor play on the road last weekend, as they tied first place Bradford 3-3 on Friday at the community centre, and then were demolished 9-2 in Huntsville on Sunday.

Before 350 fans on Friday, the young Sabres played a fast moving game, coming from behind three times to tie the Bradford Blues. Bradford led 1-0 at the end of the first period on a power play goal by veteran Scott Malloy. Late in the second period, Acton tied the score on a goal by Captain Charlie McRae, only to have Bradford score another power play goal with just four seconds left in the second period.

Early in the third period, George Trenes scored to tie the game again for Acton. However, less than a minute later Bradford's Don Bone scored to lead 3-2. Near the ten minute mark of the third period Acton's Perry Caputo scored a power play goal from the point to force the tie. The game featured excellent goal tending by Acton's Ray Dunbar and Bradford's Peter Masin. Masin is a 15 year old graduate of Bradford's minor hockey and appears to be an excellent replacement for the departed "Moose" Muizelaar.

Shortly before Friday's game, Acton's only last year player, Ray Peacock, of Georgetown, was released to play with Georgetown Raiders intermediate team. He was replaced in the lineup by Doug Strath, a former Milton midget captain, who has been playing with the Preston Raiders Junior "B" team.

In Huntsville on Sunday, it was a different story, as the Sabres collapsed, succumbing to chippy play and taking numerous foolish penalties, particularly in the first period. Huntsville led 3-0 after the first period and all three goals were scored while Acton was two men short. Huntsville went ahead 5-0 before Acton scored two fast goals, by Terry Holmes and Murray Wilson.

Rather than maintain momentum into the third period, the team relaxed near the end of the period and Huntsville scored with just 11 seconds left in the period. He hopes to return to the team next year. Since his school work was starting to suffer, the team agreed with him that he should work on this before getting too involved in hockey. Murray is a young player with lots of promise and he will no doubt benefit from another year of midget hockey. Other changes are being contemplated.

In fairness to the team, manager Bill Campbell points out that in Huntsville they were minus Charlie McRae, Steve Brunelle, Russ Van Fleet and Doug Strath, who are all key players. The team added Joe Gardin Jr. from the Acton Midgets and Joe played an excellent game, particularly considering he had played a tough midget game in Orangeville the night before and had practiced with his team at noon on Sunday, the day of the Huntsville game.

Coach Weldon should have McRae, Strath and Brunelle in the lineup for Friday's return match with Huntsville and Russ Van Fleet, wearing a special back brace, hopes to suit up also.
