Mr. Rolfe, who stayed six weeks in the north country in the summer, is touring the country to publicise the native people's position concerning land settlements and current development in the N.W.T. Mr. Rolfe told students the N.W.T. natives do not want to exchange the land for a cash settlement and reservations as the Indians in Quebec did recently.

OXFAM speaker

Indians, Metis want control of own land

The \$225 million deal which Quebec Indians settled for won't do for the Metis and Indians in the Northwest Territories, an OXFAM representative the Acton High School students last week.

Roger Rolfe told a class the Quebec Indians exchanged their land for a bulk sum and reservations. Mr. Rogers estimated the money would be spent within 20 years, and the Indians would have only the land they live on.

Indians in that type of exchange "still face discrimination and the problem of getting jobs in our society," Mr. Rogers said.

The Dene People, an Indian word combining Metis and Indians into a group, want to retain control of the land they live on, Mr. Rogers said.

Slides, tape

He addressed two classes at the high school, and later talked to citizens at the library. Mr. Rogers highlighted his talk with a slide and tape program entitled—Land and Unity.

The approximately 20,000 people live on 450,000 sq. miles between the northern border of the prairie provinces and the Arctic Ocean.

Mr. Rolfe, who visited the north country for six weeks, is on a cross-Canada tour publicising efforts by the Indians to halt the Mackenzie Valley Pipeline project until a land settlement is made with Ottawa. Mr. Rolfe also told audiences OXFAM gave the N.W.T. Indian Brotherhood \$140,000 for two years of economic studies and community development programs.

Industries

Mr. Rolfe said the Dene People wish to retain ownership of the northern land because it will let them continue hunting and fishing at the same time as developing new industries. Funds for industrial development by Indians of the north would come from mining royalties, he said.

A petition to Jules Leger, the governor-general, urging Ottawa to consider recognition of the Dene people as owners of their traditional lands, the start of negotiations on a detailed land settlement and a postponement of major development until a land settlement is completed, was circulated by Mr. Rolfe for signatures.

Mr. Rolfe said prior to his presentation that the public's response to the petition, and the tour as expressed on open line shows and comments has been good.

TB, RD campaign down by \$29,000

The Christmas Seal campaign is "down terribly" this year in Halton, according to secretary Mrs. Lunau. Just between \$6,000 and \$7,000 has been turned in so far, compared to \$35,000 at this time last year. "We are very concerned," she said Tuesday.

Vandalism cost doubled

Repair costs at Halton schools due to vandalism have climbed from \$48,000 in 1970 to \$102,000 so far this year. Superintendent of Business and Finance Bruce Lindley told Halton Board of Education Thursday.

"Vandalism hasn't increased that much, when you take into account in the last five years, we have increased the number of facilities and inflation has pushed up repair costs," Lindley noted.

The previous week Lindley informed the board the two firms giving insurance coverage for Halton schools weren't going to renew their agreement with the board when it expires next month because of the cost of vandalism claims and two major fires in recent years at an Oakville school.

"I hope by next week I will have information for the board in respect to a new carrier for our insurance."

He said his department hopes to have a report ready by the beginning of next year for the board on possible uses of surveillance equipment.
