
# Ref hands Sabres 93 penalty minutes

In Sabres' latest sallies into the rinks of the Ontario Hockey Association's Junior "C" loop, they beat Schomberg 4-2, lost 8-5 to Bracebridge, but tailled 93 penalty minutes in Bradford.




