

Kennels must be 50 ft. from neighbor's land

A kennel housing show or breeding dogs, must be 50 feet away from the nearest neighboring boundary line, according to the new kennel licensing bylaw, passed Monday night at Halton Hills council

Councillor Ern Hyde main-tained the distance was too small, and suggested 500 feet.

Mayor Tom Hill said each case can be decided on its merits when the licence comes up for renewal each

Hyde protested the bylaw was stating 50 feet, so people would assume that was the distance. "It should not be left to anyone's discretion when a licence is renewed."






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
