Committee

Halton Region's Administration Committee has approved renovations at the region's rented headquarters in Burlington. The renovations would provide a large committee room for committee meetings and the cost is estimated at \$1,800.

Councillor Carl Eriksen questioned the project and noted the council wasn't even certain that the headquarters would remain at the current location after April when the three year lease expires.

Kennels must be 50 ft. from neighbor's land

A kennel housing show or breeding dogs, must be 50 feet away from the nearest neighboring boundary line, according to the new kennel licensing bylaw, passed Monday night at Halton Hills council meeting.

Councillor Ern Hyde maintained the distance was too small, and suggested 500 feet.

Mayor Tom Hill said each case can be decided on its merits when the licence comes up for renewal each year.

Hyde protested the bylaw was stating 50 feet, so people would assume that was the distance. "It should not be left to anyone's discretion when a licence is renewed."

Miller agreed, but pointed out the bylaw still does not stop someone having 10 dogs, without a kennel licence, as long as they pay the ordinary dog licence fee.

Councillor Harry Levy explained this bylaw does not apply to someone with one dog in a doghouse, but only to those who operate a kennel for breeding and show purposes.

Councillor Les Duby said he agreed with the bylaw, because in urban areas with average size lots, the 50 feet distance from a neighboring boundary, would prevent kennels being established, in the towns.

He pointed out those who breed small dogs and have them in the house would not be affected.

\$60,000 road study okayed

"There are a number of problems which would fall into the study category, including such things as street capacity on the regional streets in the urban areas of Georgetown and Milton, the various intersection problems on Trafalgar Rd., signalization and traffic accident location problems on the Guelph Line, problems relating to intersections in Campbellville, intersections on Bronte Rd. and Speers Rd., and other areas of concern to the planning people and the police department."

"The study by a combination of traffic operation improvements systematically applied in accordance with an established plan and schedule will, with moderate expenditure, produce significant improvements in traffic flow and reduction of accidents on the existing street system," he explained.

Halton Region's Public Works Committee approved a \$60,000 traffic operations study at its meeting in Burlington Wednesday. The region's share of the study would cost \$15,000 with the balance picked up by provincial funds.

According to Director of Public Works Bob Moore, the study would recommend work that will, among other things, lead to a reduction in the accidents on roads in certain parts of the region. He assured members this wasn't just another study that would sit and gather dust on a shelf at regional headquarters.

Leaders Mrs. M. Hunter and Mrs. H. Dadds volunteered to be leaders for one 4H Group.

Final plans for the Family Party on December 13 in Laxton Hall were outlined by the president.

A short report of the District Day program was given by Mrs. Norton, who with Mrs. C. Armstrong had attended at the Maple Leaf Hall near Ashgrove.

Further refuse normally gathered Thursday, January 1st, 1976 will be picked up Friday, January 2nd.

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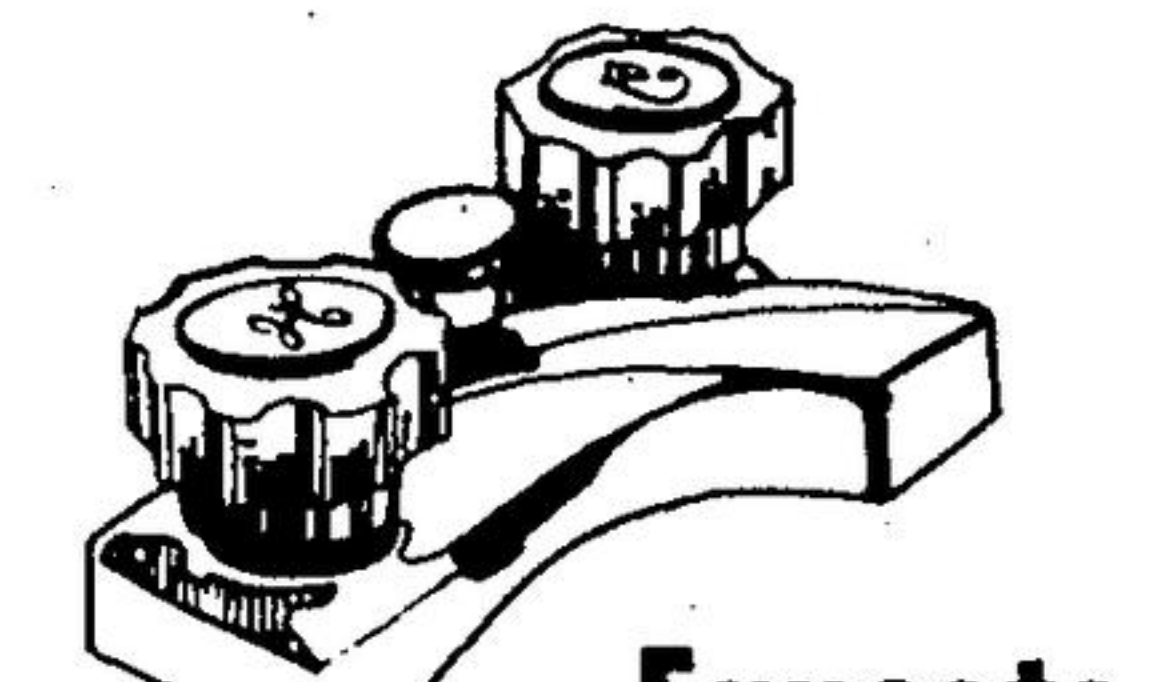


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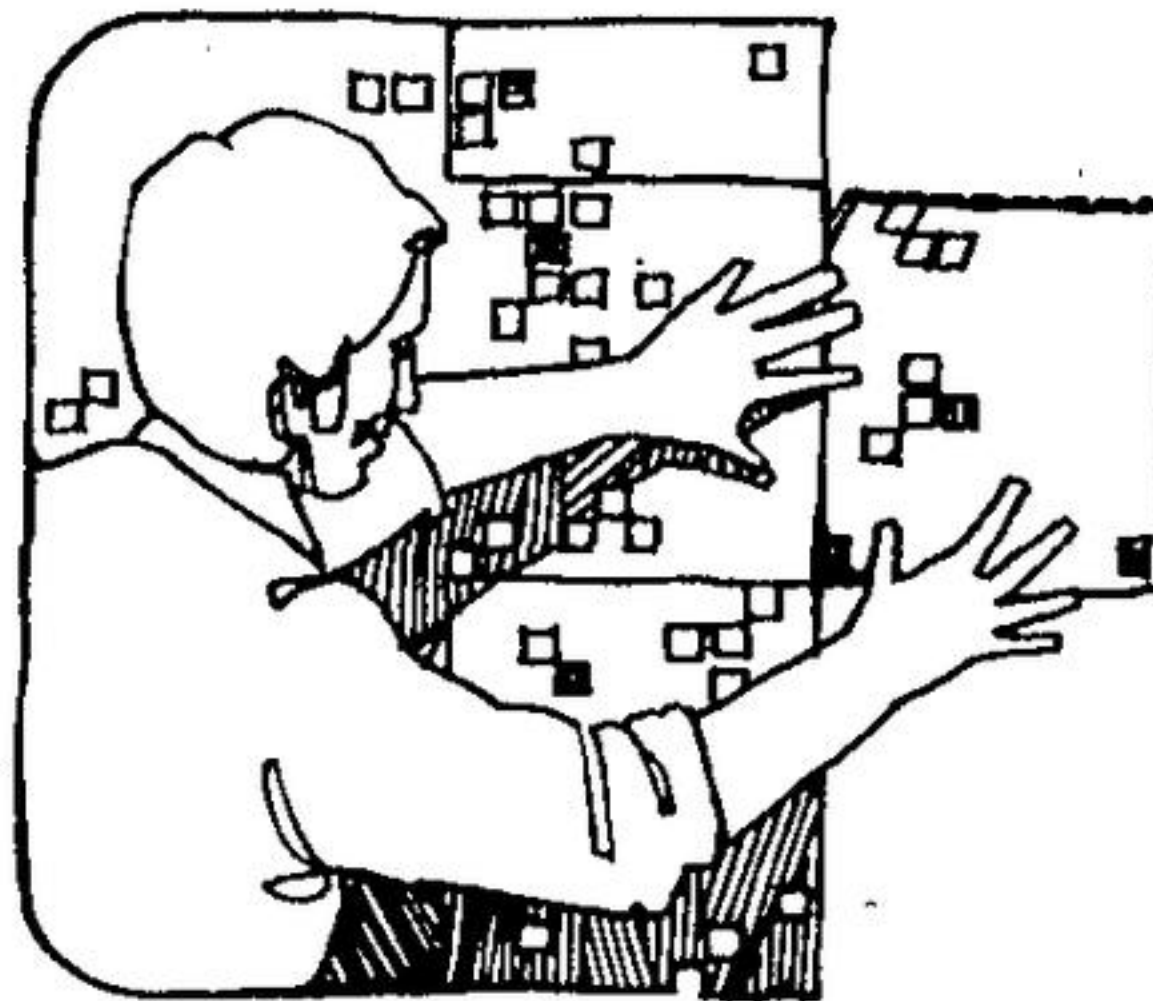
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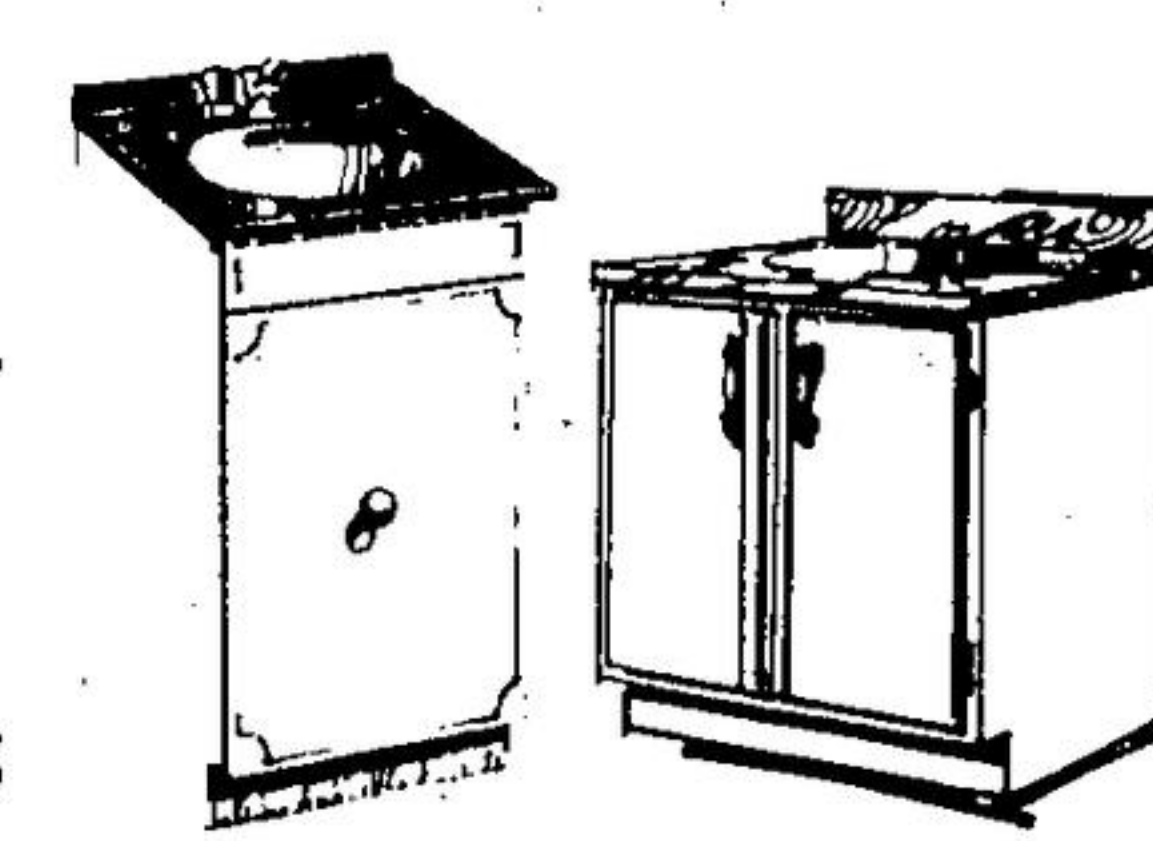
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
