Being Halton Hills Mayor Tom Hill's secretary is no easy task, but Cathy Bouskill, a warm hearted, jovial woman, handles the job in stride.

One of the most popular of all town employees Mrs. Bouskill is responsible for making sure the mayor knows when and where he is to attend town and regional council and committee meetings, Credit Valley Conservation Authority meetings, Georgetown and Acton Hydro Commission meetings, Oakville Public Utility Commission meetings, appointments with officials at Queen's Park and various other functions he attends like arena openings, fairs, public meetings, and award ceremonies.

"It keeps me pretty busy just keeping the mayor organized and making sure he knows where he is supposed to be and when," she explains.

To help her keep track of the mayor, Cathy keeps a large monthly calendar on her office wall and just keeps adding appointments and reminding the mayor of what is on his schedule for each day.

"My job for the mayor is much like any secretary's job. I schedule his appointments and try to keep him organized. There are times when I have trouble getting him to do what he should, like keeping all his appointments, because he just gets so busy," she explained.

Cathy's association with Tom Hill goes all the way back to the days when he first joined Esquimes Township council and later became reeve and then mayor of the town of Halton Hills. In her capacity as a clerk in Esquimes, as the mayor's secretary and a member of Halton Hills clerk's office, she has come to know the town's boss better than most people.

"First of all you have to learn his bark is a lot worse than his bite. He can be very abrupt and he certainly speaks his mind but that is just his style and he means nothing by it."

He is really quite a fine gentleman to work for and he is very sincere. He has the interests of all the citizens of the town at heart and you really couldn't find a warmer, finer person to work for."

Mrs. Bouskill became a municipal employee when she became assistant to the clerk of Esquimes township in October of 1959.

At that time the clerk was K. C. Lindsay and Cathy retained her job in the clerk's office when Mr. Lindsay went into semi-retirement by becoming deputy clerk several years later.

A long time Glen Williams resident Mrs. Bouskill has worn several hats during her career in municipal work.

When she worked for Esquimes she made up assessment cards, did the township's banking, prepared tax bills and certificates, served as secretary for both council and committee when the clerk was absent, and was the assistant secretary for the committee of adjustment. In 1971 she was promoted to deputy clerk and treasurer for Esquimes and took on even more chores.

Now with Halton Hills Mrs. Bouskill serves as the mayor's secretary, performs numerous duties for the clerk's department, is the secretary for the works committee, and the committee of adjustment.

"All these things keep me pretty busy but there are days when I reminisce and wish we had Esquimes back.

Now we are so big you get isolated into your own area you don't get a very good view of how the town as a whole is operating," she said.

On the topic of regional government Cathy said she thought Halton Hills is working out a lot better than I expected," but she misses the old county system and thinks the region is too big and too costly.

Mrs. Bouskill is looking forward to the day when all town offices are under one roof and she thinks this move would help both the public and town employees.

Milk better in cartons

Those familiar paperboard milk cartons serve the consumer better than the returnable three quart plastic jugs and disposable pouch packs, according to a study conducted by food scientists at the University of Guelph.

The findings of Dr. J. M. deMan and his group reveal that paperboard cartons do a substantially superior job of acting as a light screen than do the other milk packaging systems.

His report showed milk can rapidly lose its wholesome flavor and nutritive qualities when exposed to fluorescent lights in the dairy cases of food outlets.

Milk packaged in clear pouches developed oxidized flavour in three hours, and milk in returnable jugs showed off-flavor in six hours. Samples in paperboard cartons "afforded complete protection and no oxidized flavor could be detected after 48 hours."

According to Dr. deMan, light is one of milk's greatest enemies, whether it be natural daylight or artificial light. Milk starts to lose its taste and flavor as soon as it is exposed to light.

Tests revealed a wide variation in nutritional losses in milk subjected to light, depending upon the container. Exposure to light for 48 hours resulted in almost complete loss of ascorbic acid in the clear pouch (87 per cent), and the returnable jug (90 per cent), but the paperboard carton (3 per cent) was almost completely unaffected.

Dr. deMan stated his team's report was so adept in their art that they were soon able to relate the off-taste factor to almost the exact number of hours in which the samples were exposed to light. Consumers sometimes complain about a flavor development variously described as "straw" and "wet wool" when milk has been over exposed to light.

The University of Guelph study was concerned only with milk in three-quart containers or packages, and the samples were pasteurized homogenized whole milk.

The Canadian findings were similar to those conducted earlier by the University of Michigan and Penn State University.

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THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF HALTON HILLS BY-LAW NO. 75-111

A by-law to stop up and convey to the abutting owner part of Peel Street, in the Town of Halton Hills, in the Regional Municipality of Halton (formerly in the Town of Acton, County of Halton)

WHEREAS Council for this Corporation proposes to stop up and close part of Peel Street, in the Town of Halton Hills, formerly in the Town of Acton, which said portion of Peel Street is shown outlined in red on the Plan of Survey attached as Schedule "A" to this by-law and is more particularly described in the metes and bounds description attached as Schedule "B" to this by-law;

AND WHEREAS Council for this Corporation has instructed the Clerk Administrator to publish notice of Council's intention to stop up, close and convey the portion of Peel Street above mentioned to the abutting owner in accordance with the provisions of The Municipal Act, R.S.O. 1970, c. 284 as amended;

NOW, THEREFORE, COUNCIL FOR THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF HALTON HILLS ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. That part of Peel Street in the Town of Halton Hills, formerly in the Town of Acton, in the Regional

Municipality of Halton and shown outlined in red on the Plan of Survey attached as Schedule "A" to this by-law and more particularly described by metes and bounds on Schedule "B" attached to this by-law be and the same is hereby closed and stopped up.

2. Notice of the intention of Council for this Corporation to pass this by-law shall be published once a week for four consecutive weeks in the Acton Free Press and Council for this Corporation shall hear any objections to the proposed closing and conveying of the above mentioned part of Peel Street to the abutting owner at its regular meeting on the 2nd day of February, 1976 or so soon thereafter as is possible, and if there are no valid objections to the proposed closing at such meeting, Council shall give this by-law a third and final reading.

3. The Mayor and the Clerk Administrator are hereby authorized to execute under the Seal of this Corporation any documents which may be necessary for the completion of this matter.

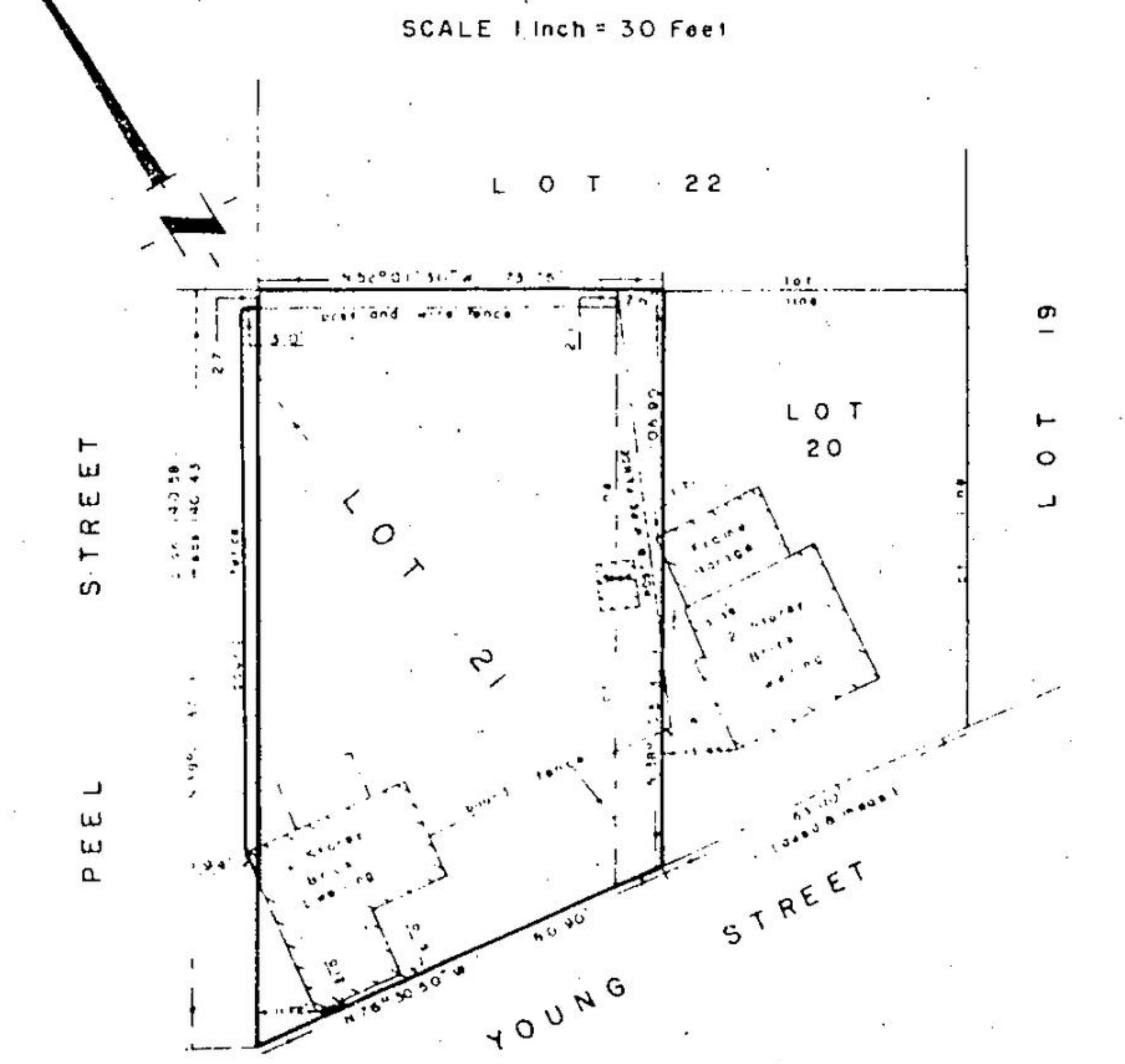

SCHEDULE "B"

ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises, situate, lying and being in the Town of Halton Hills, (formerly Town of Acton) in the Regional Municipality of Halton (formerly County of Halton) and in the Province of Ontario containing by measurement an area of 250 square feet, more or less, and being composed of part of Peel Street, Registered Plan 28 in the said Town of Halton Hills (formerly Town of Acton) and which said parcel of land may be more particularly described as follows:

COMMENCING at a point where a post and wire fence intersects the southeasterly limit of Peel Street, being also the northwesterly limit of Lot 21, Registered Plan 28, Town of Halton Hills, (formerly Town of Acton) said point being distant 2.7 feet measured southwesterly along the south-

easterly limit of Peel Street from the northerly angle of said Lot 21;

THENCE in a northwesterly direction along the said post and wire fence, a distance of 3 feet, more or less, to a point therein marking the intersection with the northwesterly face of a board fence;
