Approximately 1,100 excited spectators, including a contingent of Swedish parents, crammed into the community centre for the afternoon game.

The full impact of the inter- ' checks to pass to Bruce Mcnational match came to the crowd when the first Swedish player skated onto the ice carrying his nation's flag with a yellow cross on a blue field. Everyone stood and applauded.

The clapping continued as the entire Swedish team circled the ice. The sight of the Canadian flag at the head of the Acton squad as it paraded around the rink drew cheers and thunderous clapping from all sides of the arena.

The game, sponsored by the Acton Minor Hockey Association and the Ontario Minor Hockey Association, was the first played in Acton by a Scandinavian or a European
