Trapped in car two hours by belt - doubts law's wisdom

It was a frosty New Year's Eve for one Halton Hills' resident trying to abide by the new seat belt law.

Ian Lee of R.R. 2, Norval, found himself spending two hours of the New Year trapped in the front seat of his car after returning from a New Year's Eve party in Flesherston.

Mr. Lee knew that at midnight seat belt usage was required in any car equipped with the safety devices. He and his group buckled up for the first time in a few years.

"That was the first time I used a seat belt since the bad accident that took place near Barrie on Highway 27," explained Mr. Lee. At that time it was alleged some motorists were trapped by belts in flaming cars.

Arriving at the Flesherston address, the group, with the exception of Mr. Lee, unbuckled, leaving the owner to secure the vehicle for the night. After a few minutes of struggle with his belt, Mr. Lee sounded the horn for help.

Each of the group attempted to free the trapped driver. Because of the belt design, attempts were unsuccessful.

A call to Flesherston Ontario Provincial Police brought help. Officers managed to pry enough slack from the belt to free Mr. Lee after over two hours in the car.

"Emmerson Plester a co-worker at the Nielsen plant and host for the night, provided refreshments during the ordeal so it wasn't a complete loss," the trapped man said.

Later, OPP officers found a fragment of glass in the seat belt mechanism caused the malfunction. It is believed a sliver of glass came from a collision last month that occurred while the car was parked in downtown Norval.

Ian Lee now looks back at the incident and laughs but observes spending two hours with just the car heater and the radio for company is not the ideal New Year's Eve celebration.

"You wonder how safe belts really are if a fire had broken out in the car with the belt jammed," he reflected.

Probe blames Halton

Pollution Probe Georgetown, believes Halton is dragging its feet on a solution to the region's garbage problems.

Probe compliments the region for recognizing the importance of the garbage problem but feels the Halton technical co-ordinating committee should have expanded terms of reference to "consider the roots of the garbage problem and not just the next place for disposal."

In a brief to the committee on the solid waste recovery program Pollution Probe notes the Ministry of the Environment has defined the time scale by which mechanical resource recovery will be implemented and that will mean no significant recycling before 1980-85. "Thus the essence of your program," the brief asserts, "Must be seen in its true and narrow context, i.e. purely and simply the selection of the next landfill site (s)."

The brief, written by John Mitchell of R.R. 5, Georgetown, for Pollution Probe, considers alternatives do exist and these should be explored for "immediate implementation—not with a decade of delay."

Probe suggests Halton should initiate a program to embrace four goals:

1. Reduction of the amount of garbage at source.
2. Reuse of the greatest feasible proportion of the garbage, i.e. returnable bottles, cartons, crates, pallets, etc.
3. Recycling of those materials for which markets exist.
4. Finally—extraction of energy from the remainder to leave a minimum inert quantity for landfill or other use.

The brief notes these principles were "airily dismissed" by representatives of M. M. Dillon at a meeting at Ashgrove as "motherhood statements" only relevant to federal and provincial policy, but asserts much can be done at the regional level if the "inertia and unwarranted skepticism can be swept away."

The brief urges the technical committee to enlarge their study objectives to consider initiation of an education program aimed at the general public's
