#### PRINCIPLES OF BUSINESS LAW

Co-ordinated by D. Jack, Wellington County Law Association. 21 sessions of 2% hours each beginning Tuesday, January 20, 1976 at 7:00 p.m. Fee: \$125.00

An examination of the main principles of business law. Topics include: types of property, incorporation and bankruptcy, contracts, agency insurance, real property, condominions and cooperatives, estate planning, torts, care, defences in torts actions and expropriation. This course is a mandatory course for F.R.I. certification or may be taken for general interest. A final examination must be written to qualify for the F.R.I. designation. This course will be of interest to those engaged in any field of commerce including banking, accounting, retail sales, and manufacturing.

# CHANGING GEARS - CAREER EXPLORATION AND CHANGE

L. Gifford and A. Auger, Career Planning and Placement. 10 evening sessions of 3 hours each beginning Monday, February 2, 1976 at 7:00 p.m. Fee: \$45.00

This course is designed for those contemplating a career change or seeking an opportunity to identify the specific direction a career change should take and the steps required to implement it. Participants will be actively involved in the process of establishing their own career direction.

Upon completion of the course, participants should: a) be able to establish a career objective and a strategy for its implementation; b) be able to exercise greater personal control over the process of determining career goals and decrease dependence on others in making career-related decisions; and c) be able to identify community and area resources useful in implementing career decisions.

## CANADIANS AND INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Co-ordinated by Prof. J.C. Cairns, Director, Centre for International Programs, with the Ministerial Associations of Guelph and Kitchener-Waterloo, and the Global Community Centre, Kitchener-Waterloo. 8 lectures of 2 hours each, beginning Monday, January 12, 1976, in St. George's Church, Woolwich Street, Guelph at 12 noon (lunch available at \$1.50), and in Knox Presbyterian Church, 50 Erb Street West, Waterloo at 8:00 p.m. Fee: \$15.00

The lecture presentations will explore the problems of the Third World and examine Canada's involvement in the major issues of development. Participants will discover what Canadians are duing as a nation, through their government; as a people, through voluntary organizations and churches; and as individuals, through personal commitments. Discussions focus on the Canadian experience in international cooperation, as it is and as it should be.

#### WORLD MYSTICISM (PART II)

Dr. P. Hourihan. 10 evening sessions of 2 hours each beginning Thorsday, January 29, 1976 at 7:30 p.m. Fee: \$30.00

The course will examine intensively certain of the world's great scriptures and mystical writings. Hinduism's Bhagavad-Gita (the thief work to be studied), selections from Taoist and Islamic Sufictexts, and relevant portions of the New Testament, will be analyzed as profound documents of Mysticism. The basic premise of the course is that mysticism is universal in all religious systems and forms their common, enlightening core. The nature of mystical experience, mystical consciousness, meditative exercises, and other spritual practices which might enhance mystical enlightenment will be explored.

Part I is not a prerequisite for Part II. The introductory lecture will clarify the approach and emphasis to be followed in subsequent weeks.

### **MYSTICISM IN LITERATURE**

Dr. P. Houihan. 10 evening sessions of 2 hours each beginning Monday, January 26, 1976 at 7:30 p.m. Fee: \$30.00

The course will concentrate largely on the work of three literary mystics (William Blake, Henry Thoreau, Walt Whitman); their personalities, teachings, and experiences. Thoreau's Walden and Whitman's Song of Myself, will be studied. Selected religious mystics, East and West, will be examined for purposes of comparison and deeper insight into the overall theme of mysticism, when a mystical experience is authentic and what mystical experience and mysticism really are.
