# Request lockers in hockey room

A suggestion by Ed Wood for lockers in the arena for youngsters' hockey equipment was altered by the Acton and Esqueing Recreation Advisory Committee at their January 13 meeting.

Mr. Wood, the chairman of the committee, said he had been approached by representatives of the Legion hockey teams involved. Equipment is scattered throughout the room, he told the group, and lockers would alleviate this.

The chairman explained that the group is a non-profit organization, charging very low rates and wondered if it would be at all possible to fit the cost of lockers into the budget. He estimated the project would cost \$350.

It was the feeling of the committee that it would be costly to have the town do the job. Recreation program coordinator John Cooper suggested letting the Legion league players erect the lockers themselves, thus avoiding any costs.

# Eriksen says build

In spite of the fact three of the four members attending Halton Region's Administration and Finance Committee claim now is not the time to be building a regional headquarters, the committee recommended that council do just that.

The four committee members attending a meeting discussed the building of regional headquarters and its relation to the state of the economy for close to an hour Wednesday morning.

A recommendation urging council to hire an architect and design a building of 40,000 square feet at a cost not to exceed \$2,400,000 was passed.

The \$2,400,000 is the upper limit for retaining an architect, building the headquarters, covering costs of landscaping and providing any interior furnishings that will be needed.

Oakville Councillor Carl Eriksen advanced the motion. He was the only councillor who openly supported the motion to build.

The motion was passed in what has to be described as a most unorthodox fashion. All four members felt the matter should go before council as a positive motion.

In the washroom Oakville Councillor MacLean Anderson said he could not in all good conscience vote for the motion. Rather than vote in opposition, he went to the washroom and asked that the vote be taken in his absence.

Committee Chairman David Coons voted in favor of the motion but warned that he would speak against it and vote against it when it goes before council today. The motion carried.

A staff report on the matter analyses costs of renting space compared to the cost of paying for a building and the ownership option is reported to be less expensive.

(Continued from page one) everyone she spoke to, that the ducks should not be fed and they will go away, looking for their own food.

Mrs. Sheldon wondered, if the birds were kept, whose job was it going to be to feed them? Would it be a separate position, or absorbed into someone else's job?

The committee member said she spoke to Esther Taylor, known throughout the town for her fondness for the ducks. "For her alone," Mrs. Sheldon said, "it would be a disgrace to take them away, because they are her babies."

She felt a recommendation should be made to council to try to keep the birds, although she knows it is not the "right" thing to do.

Committee chairman Ed Wood said he would like the general feelings of the people of the town. He wondered if there was any way of taking the tame birds out of the lake after September, in the hope the wild fowl would fly south. The tame ones could then be put back in the water in the summer. He felt if the wild birds do not get fed in the winter, they will not stay in the winter. He said he would like to hear the public's opinion, either at his home or in his store.

**Selfish**

Recreation Program Coordinator John Cooper pointed out, "Whose sake are you doing it for, the birds' or the people? If you are doing it for the people, it is selfish."

Mrs. Sheldon said it was selfish but she would rather have \$2,000 to feed the ducks wrong, than to send them away.

Kerwin McPhail said the pond on his property has ducks on it before the ice leaves in the spring, and then around the middle of September, they leave. "Whether they go and let Esther feed them, I do not know." He admitted it is hard not to feed the ducks, and said he sometimes gives them food, but not on a regular basis.

Ed Wood would like people to drop into his home or store or the town office and give their opinion about what should be done.

"A law for people not to feed the birds is just as unenforceable as the seat belt law," Mrs. Sheldon said.

The committee made a motion to council to review what has been done, and what is going to be done.

# Don't feed birds—CVCA

Plans to feed the flocks at Fairy Lake, Acton will take wing if the advice of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority is followed.

"Is the town of Halton Hills responsible for the birds?" asked Mayor Tom Hill at Thursday's CVCA executive meeting.

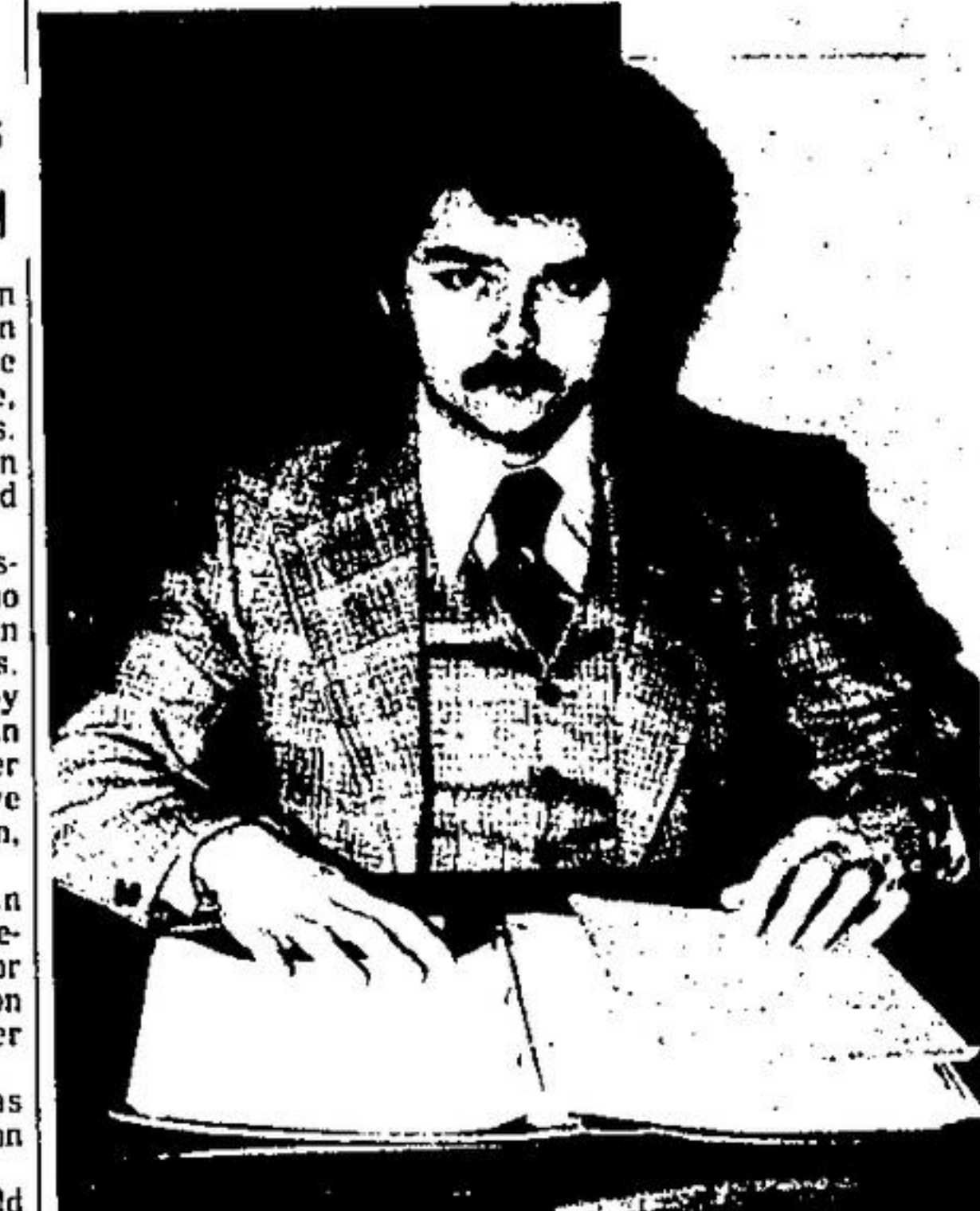
"Let nature take its course" Mr. Hill was told by Authority chairman, Grant Clarkson, who commented the Ministry of Natural Resources invariably gave the same advice.

Mayor Hill was referring to the current controversy surrounding the wildlife at Fairy Lake. Council has allocated \$1200 for the care and feeding of the multitude during this winter. Private citizens were the original caretakers of the flock now numbering several hundred.

The member from Orangeville, H. P. Darraugh, stated the same problem had occurred earlier in his area.

"It's the people who like to see the birds who are causing the problem," he said, "Don't pamper them and they'll go away."

The Authority recommended town and residents refrain from feeding the ducks next fall in order to allow the natural migratory instinct to take over.
