In Acton housing permits dropped from 275 in 1974 to 132 this year. In Esquesing, (Ward 2) housing permits dropped from 79 to 67.

The number of housing permits in the Georgetown area this year jumped from 14 last year to 116 this year, due primarily to Marywood Mea-

**Building Inspector Sargent** said the drop in Acton and Esquesing shows the dwindling supply of available residential lots.

A number of large industrial projects boosted this year's total to an increase of \$347,651, despite three fewer permits being issued. Included in the larger industrial permits this year were Georgetown Medical Clinic, Shoprite Store, an addition to Burns Warehouse, two new industrial malls on Armstrong Avenue, McDonald's Restaurant, the new Cercor factory, the residence for the mentally retarded at Hornby. the addition to North Halton Golf and Country Club, new factory on Armstrong Avenue, the Loblaws addition, the Penecostal Church on Highway 7, six stores and offices on Mountainview South, Halton Region Day Care centre on Maple Avenue, an addition to the town works garage on the Seventh Line, and an addition to Commercial Shearing's plant on Commerce Court,

# Chop roads budget

Halton Region's Public Works Committee will chop close to \$190,000 from its proposed \$2,212,900 roads budget at its regular meeting this afternoon.

Considering the budget last week, the committee agreed not to spend any funds on projects that do not receive provincial subsidies.

The region's subsidy for roads this year is \$992,000. With the region paying its share, a total of \$1,984,000 can be spent.

The bulk of that budget is set aside for the reconstruction of the Guelph Line from Highway 5 to upper Middle Road in Burlington. That project alone will cost over

Other major projects rating high on the priority list include property acquisition and engineering for Upper Middle Rd. in Oakville at \$200,060 and the realignment and construction of Campbellville Rd. from the Town Line to the Fifth Line at \$176,000. All other projects are under \$100,000.

Of the 41 projects considered, staffers identified 32 projects that they feel should be done this year.

The proposed budget for water and sewer programs calls for an expenditure of \$18,808,090. The regional committee will also attempt to cut over \$6,000,000 from those estimates.

### Heart decals for handicapped

"Have a Heart-Save a Life" is the theme of an on-going public safety campaign faunched last year by the Halton Region Fire Prevention Committee.

The Committee is offering free heart-shaped decals to handicapped residents of the region. The bright red decals are to be placed on the window in the front door, or the window nearest the front door, to alert firefighters in case of an emergency that there is a handicapped person or invalid living in that building who may require special

In apartment buildings, decals are placed behind the glass of the intercom system in the lobby and the apartment number will be noted on the decal.

Nocharge Decals are available from

all the fire halls in Halton Region, at no change.

Committee chairman Capt. Jim Coulson of Milton Fire Department said the "Have a Heart program has been running about a year and to date approximately 100 decals have been distributed. But the Committee feels there are more invalids or handicapped persons who should be displaying a decal on their place of residence.

"The heart program is NOT a substitute for fire safety or responsibility," Capl. Coulson stressed. "Firefighters will always make a thorough search of any building but the decal will alert the firefighter to look for an eld-

erly or handicapped person.
"Heart decals point the way to a speedy rescue," he said. "They are intended to be an extra safety aid, not a


