In the second game the teams remained in a 1-1 tie at the end of the first 15 minutes of play, on team cap-

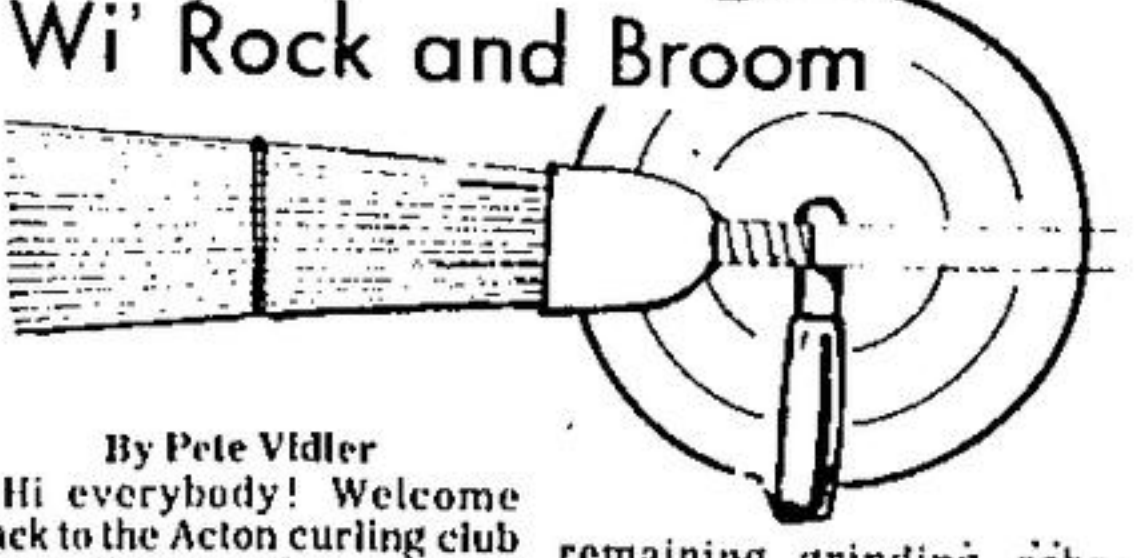
tain Scott Malcolm's first goal and a reply for Fergus by Paul Gear.

Novices will take on Erin next Tuesday night.

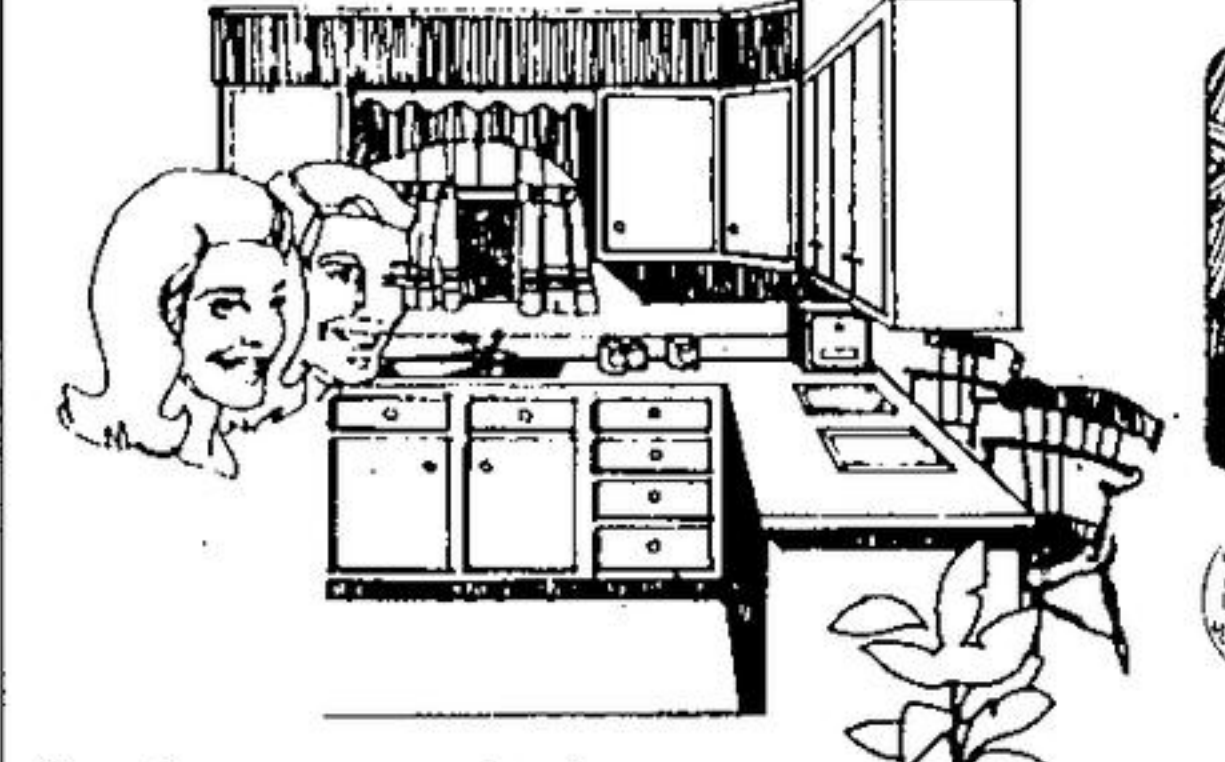
