More teenagers under care

The number of teenagers in parents, completed adoptions the care of the Children's Aid Society of Halton (CAS) during 1975 increased by 49 percent, the annual meeting of the society was told last weck.

Former Executive Director Gordon Askwith, who resigned March 1 for personal reasons, said in a report this teenage increase "has had a great deal to do with the repeal of section 8 of the Training Schools Act which means that unmanageable children are no longer being sent to training school, but come into our care.

"These older children have created greater pressure on our staff and foster homes, even though we opened two new adolescent homes last July."

Inforefront

Dr. Askwith said "our Society has been in the forefront of those asking for proper financing and assistance for children in this group. We have held press conferences, meetings and have pressured the provincial government for an early solution to this problem. We have still no

Earlier, CAS President G. G. Heym had said "I feel the provincial government must provide financial sources before referring children from section eight to us" in an address to 100 members of the society at the meeting in Mil-

Population stable Dr. Askwith noted, however, that the CAS child care population (compared to teenagers) did not increase

as had been anticipated. In his year-end review, the executive director referred to the adoption of children, and said "we notice a continuing decline in the number of children available for adoption, even though we have continued to work with children from other Societies.

"This reduction in children is an unhappy situation for prospective adopting parents who may have a long wait for a child and in some instances there may be no children available at all."

Dr. Askwith also said the CAS of Halton during 1975 "began the year with 142 children in our care, admitted 131 children into our care, placed 41 children in adoption, and placed 14 other Society children in adoption.

Children returned "We returned 82 children to

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for 40 of our children, completed adoptions for 18 other Society children, and ended the year with 142 children in our care (including 29 on adoption probation).

"We reported on 94 private and parent adoptions, assisted 92 unmarried mothers in plans for infants, completed 71 divorce reports and 1,053 other miscellaneous services.

"We helped 1,249 children in their own homes through service to 542 families."

Restraints hurt

CAS President Heym said "the budget restraints announced by the provincial government for 1976 (5.5 percent) severely hit our Society and a rollback in some services is unavoidable. After four budget drafts, the final budget was submitted in accordance with the restraints.

"However, a special resolution was forwarded to the Cabinet of the provincial government requesting an additional amount of 1.7 percent to cover commitment to our fester parents.

"Reaction on the resolution from area MPPs was positive. The resolution was endorsed by all elected and appointed directors at the final budget meeting in January 1976. We should hear from the Cabinet in the very near fu-
