Board reveals cuts

Library books, audio visual equipment, school maintenance, furniture and health services are among the victims of the Halton Board of Education's cost-cutting program this year. Thursday, in the second of several budget presentations, the board examined the costs of running school operations, school maintenance, attendance, health and food services and educational services. The board will spend \$442,742 or 5.1 per cent more in these three areas this year than it did last. Much of the increase is blamed on a large insurance premium increase for the board's buildings and a jump in unemployment insurance, workmen's compensation, OHIP and pension plan payments. Education services spending has been slashed from \$1,140,845 to \$978,673 this year. Education services include library work, guidance, audio visual and research. Attendance, health and food services have also been severely curtailed with the board planning to spend only \$89,885 compared to \$103,759 last year. School operation will cost \$6,608,549, up \$730,693 over last year. Spending for school maintenance is down \$111,905 to \$1,431,974 for this year. The board will spend \$9,109,081 in the four areas compared to \$8,666,339 last year.

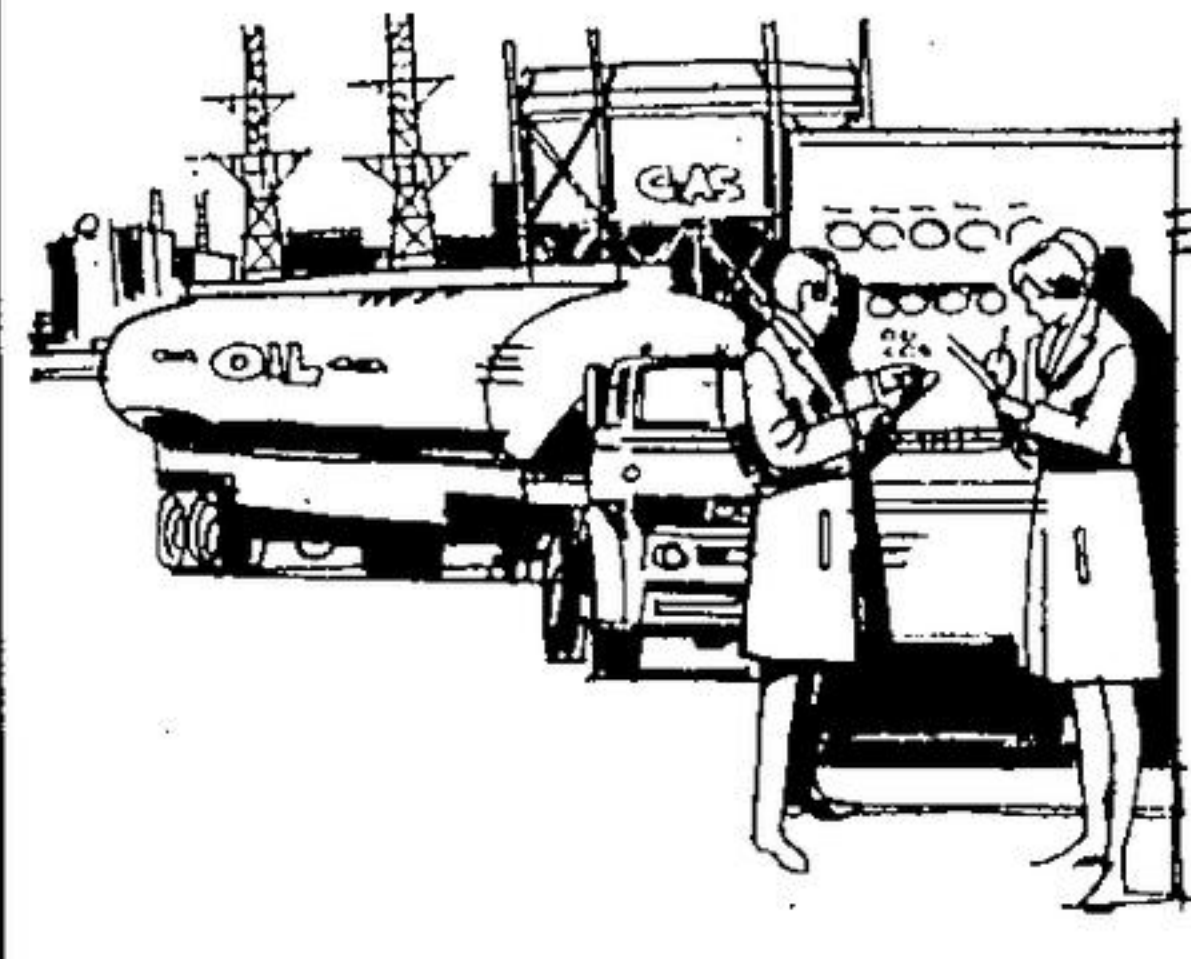
