No decision made by OMB Berton Scharf still waiting

by Kerry Chalmers St. Patrick's Day meant more than leprechauns to Berton Scharf, a Rockwood realtor, who after months and months of uncertainty, faced the hearing he has been waiting for. Bankrupt The 32 acres was bought in two parcels of 28 and four acres in the fall of 1973. J. K. W. paid \$242,000 for the first parcel and \$55,000 for the second.
