

Snowracers can cover a half-mile oval track in 30 seconds with top speeds on a stretch reaching 90 m.p.h. Mr. Copeland started

racing on snowmachines three years ago. He took a second place in the Y's Men's sponsored races over Fairy Lake early in '74.
