The "Trees for Canada" project was launched on a trial basis in Ontario in 1972. A similar program "Trees for Tomorrow" was undertaken in Manitoba. Both of these projects have proven that Scouts enjoy the opportunity to get ersonally involved in contributing to the future of Canada, In 1975 Scouts planted more than two munion trees.

Help Scouts "Trees for Canada" is also 'a fund raising project. The funds raised will be used to help further Scouting in the community, to develop the Provincial Leaders' Training Centre at Acton, promote outdoor Scouting and meet local needs. Some of the money raised will be used to support "Operation Amigo", an international program Canadian Scouting designed to help five South American countries adapt Scouting to meet their needs. These funds are raised through pledges from people in the com-

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
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
