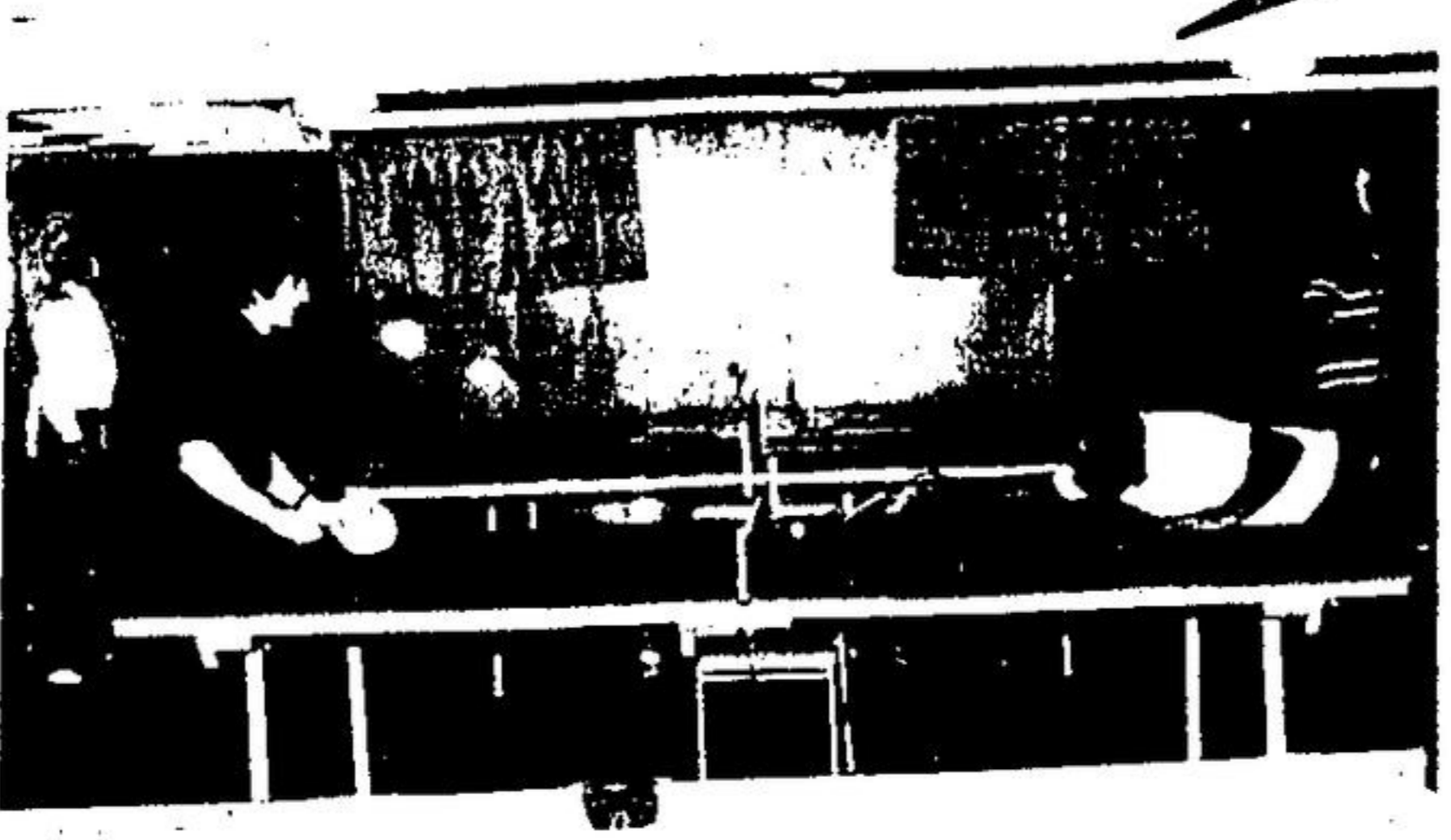


Spilling the pins at Acton Bowling Lanes with Ken Hulford

Halton MP supports doctors' incomes

Halton MP Dr. Frank Philbrook went to bat for his colleagues in the medical field recently during debates in the House of Commons on doctors' costs, noting doctors shouldn't be singled out as villains in rising health costs.

Dr. Philbrook told the MPs, doctors have been practising wage restraint since 1971: during the last four years inflation went up over 30 per cent while doctors' pay has gone up only 16.25 per cent.

In spite of losing ground economically doctors are prepared to co-operate with the anti-inflation program and said people working in medicine want to see restraints applied fairly and consistently, including the areas involving medicine.

Dr. Philbrook said he didn't think doctors were seeing extra patients just to add to their income and suggested patients must bear part of the blame for heavy medical workloads.

He noted far too often doctors just don't know how to say no to a patient and this affects their own health, leading to excessive drug and alcohol use and mental problems. Dr. Philbrook added it isn't easy for a doctor to just dismiss patients because he has too much business already.

Dr. Philbrook suggested the number of doctors needed in Canada and their distribution is something which must be examined.

He endorsed suggestions that the flow of foreign trained doctors, into Canada, be slowed.
