HFA's Middlebrook says

Parties playing politics with farm statistics

Ontario Agriculture Minister William Newman and NDP Leader Stephen Lewis were both criticized last week by the chairman of the Halton Federation of Agriculture (HFA) for "playing politics" with statistics on the number of farmland across the province.

Harold Middlebrook, or R. R. 2, Milton, said in a telephone interview that "they're playing politics with figures and I feel the farmer is the person caught in bet-

Farm acreage up The HFA chairman was commenting on a major speech made in Toronto Wednesday night, in which the agriculture minister claimed the acreage being farmed or capable of production in two regions and three counties has increased since the 1971 federal census.

Mr. Newman, in a speech to the Canadian Daily Newspaper Publishers Associa-tion, said for example that the number of acres in Halton and Peel regions together which are in production or could be farmed today is 375,067, an increase of 29 per cent over 1971.

The agriculture minister said his figures were based on up-to-date computerized assessment rolls compiled by the provincial ministry of

The New Democratic Party, meanwhile, is on record as saying Ontario farmland between the years 1966 and 1971 was disappearing at the rate of 26 acres an hour. The party based this information on the 1971 federal census, and has suggested the problem is likely worse today.

"Mr. Lewis is getting his information from federal statistics of 1971, while Mr. Newman is using assessment figures which only go back about three years." "We've seen a lot of

building in the past 10 years. The HFA chairman said "most of the land Mr. Newman is talking about is being held by speculators, and because of the 50 per cent rebate on farm taxes the speculators have decided to put the land back into production to get this farm tax rebate."

"They're both right but they're both wrong. Minister pleased

Agriculture Minister Newman expressed delight with the 29 per cent increase in acreage being farmed or available for production in Halton and Peel, and told his audience this comes "smack in the middle of all the developmennt we've seen west and northwest of Metropolitan Toronto."

And he denied strongly a suggestion from reporters that he might have selected areas of Ontario which were favorable to his argument.


