Region short of P.R. men? one under nose for free

Public interest in waste and resource recovery is prompting numerous requests for speakers on the subject, Halton Public Works Committee was told last week. Members and works staff said they didn't have the time.

Bill Johnson, well known as a knowledgeable speaker on the subject told this newspaper he is offering his services free, if they are looking for someone to take the lead off the Region Works Department.

He said he would be willing to explain the alternatives to landfill sites. "All they would have to do is provide a hall, 16 m.m. sound projector and an audience, I'll do the rest."

He said he is prepared to go anywhere in the area at his own expense, provided the time fits into his shift work schedule.

Mr. Johnson, nicknamed Wicked Willie for his outspoken criticism of present garbage disposal methods, is well-qualified for the speaker's podium. He has written newspaper and magazine articles, lectured to elementary and high school students, women's groups, the Chamber of Commerce, and has spoken with all levels of government.

"I have no axe to grind, I have never been threatened with a dump in my backyard, but I've studied the subject and become a bit of an authority on the subject."

To fix Heard's sidewalk

After viewing his problem during the spring roads tour Halton Hills works committee decided Monday to fix the sidewalk in front of the home of Charles Heard, 114 Church Street.

Mr. Heard has previously complained to the town about water settling in his driveway ever since his street was rebuilt last year. He said the water settled in pools and hampered driving during cold weather.

Deputy engineer Ted Ballinger told the committee that the sidewalk will be lowered approximately two inches in front of Mr. Heard's driveway. Only four blocks of sidewalk will have to be adjusted.

Recommend break for clubs

Finance and personnel committee of Halton Hills Council has recommended an amendment to the town's by-law regulating hawkers and peddlers, which would allow licenses to be issued to duly authorized representatives of local service clubs, local fraternal societies or local charitable organizations, who have resided for at least one year in the town, for \$1. Usual fee hawkers and peddlers must pay to work in Halton Hills under the by-law is \$100.

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Portable sound system

A portable sound system costing \$162 may be used in town-owned halls, if council goes along with a recommendation made by Halton Hills administration committee, Monday night.

Facility Superintendent said the four halls are being used more and more and there is no sound system in any of them, and suggested the purchase of a portable one as a economical solution. He said it could also be used at swimming pools during competitions or outside.

Recreation Director Glen Gray pointed out it could be used as a back-up system at an arena if one fails.

He said the unit could be available to all groups at a nominal fee, and would recover the cost in a year.

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
