Club warns of dangers

Now is the time of the year when swimmers would like to try their hand at scuba diving. Unless you are a certified diver or getting ready for your first open water check-out, DON'T.

The Halton Scuba Trek Club warns of the many dangers people can get into, if not properly instructed. First of all, a good dive shop will not fill tanks, unless the diver has his certificate.

Tanks should be checked after the long winter break. Contamination in the tanks

will lead to serious problems. Regulators should be gone over to make sure everything is functioning properly. Buoyancy compensator vests and regular vests should be checked for tears or leaks, making sure the firing pin for your CO2 cartridge is working freely. Check your cartridge to make sure it has not been used.

Each individual diver has to have his own amount of lead weight to correspond with his flotation. Also, this belt should have a quick re-

lease for emergencies. A good fitting wet suit makes the difference between being cold and being comfortable. Improper fitting face masks bring more stress to the diver.

Not knowing at what depths you can dive or how to clear your ears at different depths will cause serious injuries. If decompressing tables are not followed correctly, more serious problems are in store for the diver.

Entries into unknown waters may be easy, but trying to get back out to land or a boat may be a different story. Do not go diving alone. Always have a buddy around. The Halton Scuba Trek Club highly recommends that swimmers in good physical shape and good health take a scuba course with a qualified instructor. There are courses available, usually in the fall and early spring. Ditch deep diving and dive safely.

Enclose Hornby pitching machine

The pitching machine bought by the Hornby Ball Club from their own funds last year, may have an enclosure built around it.

Halton Hills administration committee gave it their blessing provided there is no cost to the town, and the financing can be arranged. John Cooper, Area Recreation Co-ordinator for Ward 1 and 2, said the Hornby Ball Club feels they can raise the money themselves, with the help of a Wintario grant.

The enclosure 12 to 15 feet wide, 10 feet high and about 80 feet long, would be installed

behind the bleachers along the third base line next to diamond A. The Hornby Ball Club would look after the scheduling of the use of the machine, which could be booked by other clubs.

Bill Schreiber of the club, said in a letter the enclosure would make it safe to use while a game is in progress. John Cooper said the club already has donors willing to help.

The pitching machine, bought in 1975, was paid for by the club by volunteer work parking cars at the 1974 International Plowing Match.
