

Late tax bills upset residents

Milton Mayor Anne MacArthur has received calls from all parts of the municipality urging her and council to expedite budget proceedings and the subsequent tax bil-

"People don't have all that much money and they want to know how much their taxes are going to be. They don't want to wait as long as they did last year," Mayor Mac-Arthur told Milton Council during a budget session Tuesday night.






