## Nine schools enter music festival

Thirty-nine choirs from nine schools participated in the North Halton Music Festival last Wednesday. The festival held at M. Z. Bennett was well attended by parents and friends who came to hear the children singing.

Winner of the Triple Duet for the Grade 5 and 6 classes was Martin St. School in Milton. M. Z. Bennett school placed second and Robert Little, both of Acton, placed third.

Robert Little School's primary choir from Grades 1 and 2 won in their division. They were followed closely by Brookville and M. Z. Bennett schools.

In the intermediate choir division for students in grades 5 and 6 Robert Little and Brookville choirs tied for first. Joseph Gibbons school in Georgetown placed second and Martin St. and M. Z. Bennett tied for third.

The junior choirs for grade 3 and 4 students singing "Listen Inside the Sound" was won by Robert Little followed by M. Z. Bennett and Brookville.

Glen Williams students won a first in the primary choir division for schools with less than 250 students singing "Two Kites and a Rain Cloud". Limehouse placed second.

The junior choir from Percy Merry school in Milton singing "Sing a Rainbow" won first place in their category for schools with under 250 students. They were followed closely by Glen Williams and Limehouse schools.

The triple duet for schools with under 250 students, with five entries, was won by a group from Howard Wrigglesworth school. Placing second was Percy Merry and another choir from Howard Wrigglesworth placed third.

M. Z. Bennett won the boys' choir for unchanged voices competition. They were followed closely by Brookville and in third a tie between Robert Little and Martin St. Brookville won the boys' changed voices choir class. Robert Little placed second

### New bylaw tells

## What you can't do in parks

Members of Wards 1 and 2 recreation advisory committee Wednesday reviewed the second draft of the Halton Hills parks bylaw clause by clause - all of them from A to Z and then starting back at AA to KK.

The bylaw forbids a great variety of activities in parks. Members commented as they went through the bylaw and they asked area co-ordinator John Cooper to arrange for them to see the final draft before it is presented to council.

The extent of the regulations caused councillor Les Doby to explain having so much in a bylaw is "just a formality." Police can then act if there are complaints. There must be a bylaw for them to refer to.

The bylaw covers motorized vehicles (which must stay on roads), picnics (permits needed for organized groups), camping (no). There is to be no indecent conduct or language, "loitering, spying or frightening" of people. No defacing, liquor, or illicit drugs. There's to be no harm done to trees, plants or animals. No carting manure through in trucks. No betting, no picking worms. People must be sufficiently clad. No one is to enter after 11 p.m. or before 7 a.m. No political speeches.

Exceptions Written permission of the town is required for any changes. The regulations state no one may camp overnight; for instance, yet at fall fair time the carnival workers stay in the park. Exceptions such as this as provided

for. Members suggested signs be posted at parks offering rewards for information leading to the apprehension of vandals.

Tours Each member had also been given an area of ward one or ward two to tour, listing the recreation facilities available. Members reported some of their discoveries and problems.

The Ukrainian camp and Glen Williams especially impressed members who hadn't been there before. They learned Acton's golf club is not in Halton Hills but in Erin township and Terra Cotta conservation area in Halton, not Peel. One member reported getting lost on the roads of north-east Halton Hills.

Role? The role of the advisory committee has never been set out plainly. Members have been asked to write out their opinions of their own duties, so a concrete statement may be prepared by recreation director Glenn Gray.

Chairman Ed Wood has some of the written statements on hand and requested the others be given to him soon.

A letter of resignation from the advisory recreation advisory committee was received from Kerwin McPhail. A letter of thanks will be sent. Present at the meeting in the town offices were chairman Ed Wood, recreation committee members Joan Aggiss, Mary Ann Barrow and Elmer Dunn with councillor Les Doby and area co-ordinator John Cooper.

### Jailed three months

An Acton teenager who admitted trafficking in marijuana and hashish for one and one-half years in the town and at Acton District High School in particular was jailed Wednesday for three months.

Judge William Sharpe of provincial court in Milton sentenced the 17-year-old male to three months behind bars on two charges of trafficking in a restricted drug, and trafficking in narcotics.

Concurrent terms He ruled, however, that the

two terms would be served at the same time.

Drug squad detectives from Halton Regional Police arrested the young man last Nov. 7 after he went on a shopping trip to Toronto to purchase illegal drugs.

Court was told the teenager paid \$200 for a pound of marijuana and \$230 for one-quarter pound of hashish. Police said the drugs had a street value of \$1,500.
