## Visitors jump on Rams' slow start

Windsor and Mississauga Junior "C" lacrosse teams took advantage of Acton Rams' early game generosity but in both cases neglected to extend the same courtesy to their hosts.

As a result Rams suffered two consecutive losses by identical five goal margins.

Mississauga Medics edged Rams 16-11 Monday. Windsor Athletic Association (WAA) got by the home team 19-14.

In both games the visiting clubs took first period leads which Rams had to tie, in Windsor's game, or play catch-up ball all the way as against Mississauga.

Rams showed signs of coming alive against Windsor last Thursday, in the second frame. Rams tied the visitors ten all. Windsor, however, curbed Acton's attack to four goals in the final frame, while putting away nine markers in the process.

Windsor led eight-five after the first period, a 10-10 tie came out of the second, and the final period's scoring shows 9-4 for WAA.

#### Identical

The first period of the Mississauga game was the difference, because the next two frames scoring was

identical. Medics led 9-4 after the first 20-minutes. Both sides scored five times in the second period and twice in the final frame.

A slippery deck slowed both teams' attacks in the WAA game, but the visitors still managed to check the Ram forwards.

Ram top scorers Steve Wilson and Ron Turkosz took turns flicking red lights against Mississauga and Windsor. Wilson fired five

Underlining the importance of practices, the coach said that if Rams had five of them in a row, with a full turnout, the team could take anyone.

Ram penalties figured heavily in the loss to Mississauga. The visitors took less than half the home teams minutes in the box. Medics tallied 26 penalty minutes to Acton's 57.

Both Rams and Windsor settled on 48 minutes in penalties.
