

Axe falls

The axe fell for 100 hundred long service employees at Douglas Aircraft Co. of Canada, Friday. This latest lay-off part of a gradual lay-off extending over the past three years brings the number of employees down to 1300 at the large Malton plant.

This lay-off saw 58 hourly employees, 13 office workers, 25 salaried employees and 4 guards given notice, effective July 16.

A spokesman for the company said "We can't go on building speculative planes at a cost of \$30,000,000 each.

All of the employees affected have more than 10 years service, with some having more than 25 years at Douglas.

At the peak period 1969 and 1970 the company employed 7,000 in the manufacture of wings for the DC10 and wings and tails for the DC9.

The company, a subsidiary of McDonnell Douglas of St. Louis, Missouri, has now and in the past years employed many residents of Halton Hills, some of whom are affected by this most recent cut.
