After receiving a legal opinion from the town solicitor the committee decided the only fences the municipality must help pay for are those which are already up, separating town and private property, and must be repaired.

Considerable debate went on among committee members about what to do about the existing policy of the town paying half the cost of a fence on private property which abuts town-owned land other than road allowances.

The town budgeted \$1,000 for fencing this year and already the applications received have caten the money up.
