Rams split two on tour Artem bursts for ten goals

Acton Rams tested their first road victory of the season Sunday, in the second of a two game tour that took them to Owen Sound and Mississauga.

Rams led throughout last Sunday's game at Mississauga against the Medics in Ontario Lacrosse Association Junior "C" action. Acton led 7-3 after the second and outscored the Medics 4-3 in the

final 20-minutes to take the evening match 15-10.

Manage On the shores of Georgian Bay Rams were left swimming in the last two-thirds of their game with Owen Sound Satellites. Acton managed to come away from the initial period with a 5-3 lead.

However, in less than four minutes of the second frame, Owen Sound rifled in four goals to end the period 12-7

and take the game 21-13. George Artem is turning into a prolific scorer, at home and on the road. He returned after notching ten goals and picking up half-as-many assists against both foes.

Last season's top marksmen for Rams, Ron Turkosz and Steve Wilson were both held in check on the road. Turkosz had to settle for a goal and an assist while Wilson came home with a

Collect Tim Chisholm collected four goals and as many assists while Kevin Marcoux and Rick Van Fleet got half as many goals and assists each.

Wayne Young fired a goal against Owen Sound and Mississauga. Bill Mathieson got a goal

and one assist while Gary Fisher and Fred Allen got single goals.

Jan McCausland and John DeCoursey assisted twice on goals and Al McMinn and Doug Taylor once each.

Penalties Owen Sound out did Acton in the penalty section with 40 minutes compared to Rams 36. Acton collected 20 more minutes than the Medics who spent 29 minutes in the box.

Goalie John DeCoursey went into the nets at the 14:16 mark of the second period in the Owen Sound game, and went the distance at Mississauga for the win.

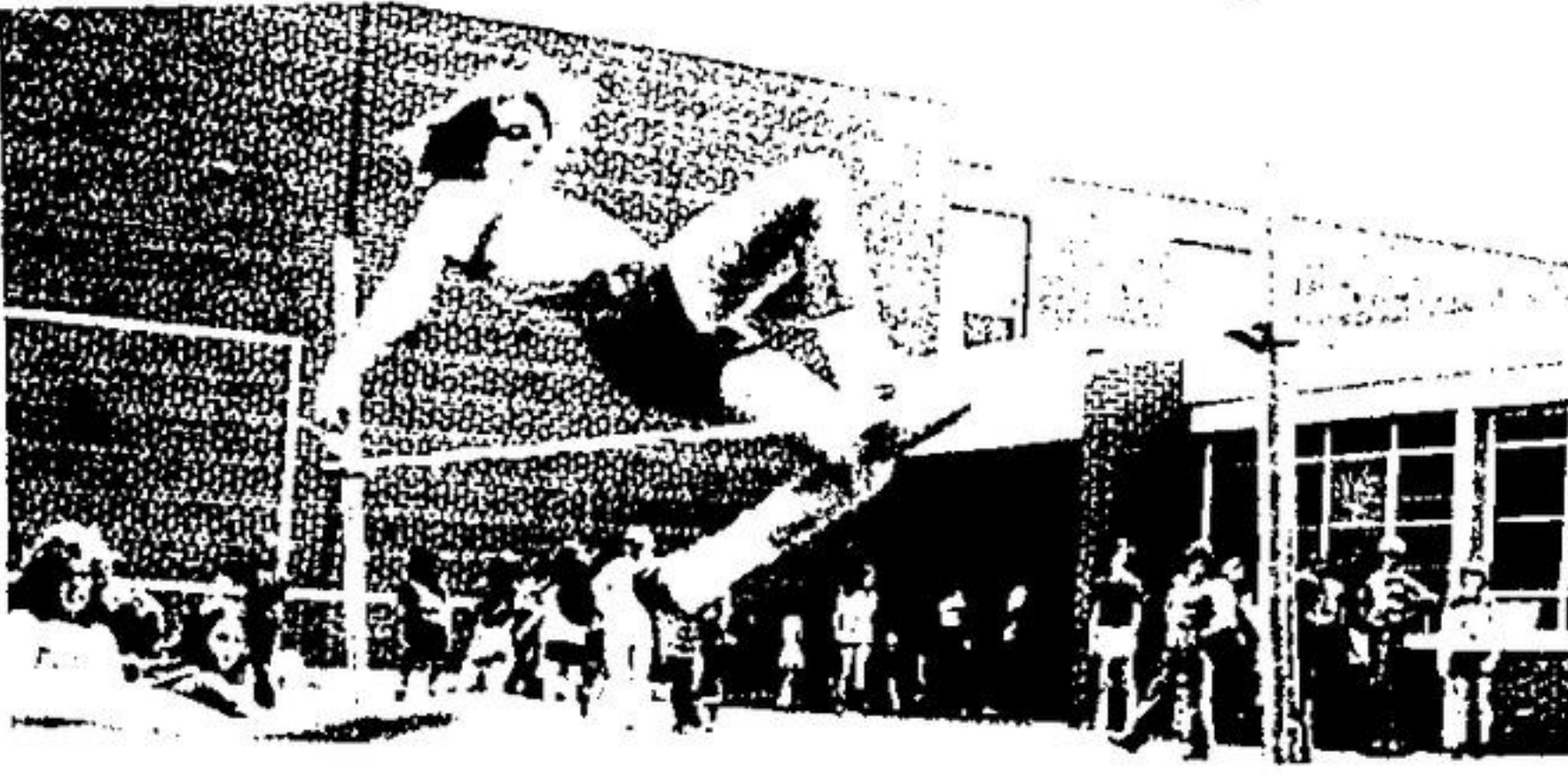

MZB track meet sets many marks

Several school records were broken during M. Z. Bennett's intermediate track and field meet last Friday. Intermediate boys took the bulk with four records falling to Dave Lawson and a pair to Martin Collerton.

Lawson's 29.4 in the 200 metre run beat the '74 mark set by Brian MacDonald. In the 400 metre race Lawson shaved point four seconds off Steve Lumbers' 73 seconds flat run. The new mark is 72.6 seconds.

Another of Lumbers' marks fell to Lawson in the 800 metre distance run. Lumbers' 75 mark of 2:40 was bettered by 2:37.2.

In the shot put Lawson tossed the ball 11.10 metres, a throw which outdistanced Bob McClure's mark of 9.45.

In the sprints, Martin Collerton's 14.7 in the 100 metre was good enough to surpass the '74 record held by Doug Darby. Collerton also clipped point one seconds off Bill

Humenick's mark. The new record for the 80 metre hurdles is 15.5.

On the senior level, Bob McClure cut point six seconds from Dave Dunn's 30 second flat mark in the 200 metre event. The new record is 29.4.

In the 800 metre hurdles McClure set a new mark of 15.2, which edged out Anthony Quinn's 1975 mark of 15.3.

Also in senior events, Lance Alton added three centimetres to the high jump record. He leapt 158 cm to better the mark of 155 set in 1974 by Gord Bruce.

In boys junior races Robert Andrews set a trio of new school records. He beat Jim Allonby's 1974 mark in the 200 metre race with a time of 31.6. The old mark was 37.1.

Andrews in the 400 metre race set the mark of 1:14, which was good enough to beat Gary Lumbers' old mark of 1:17.

Andrew clipped seven seconds from Dave Lawson's

75 mark in the 800 metre event. The new time is 2:43.

Gary Lumbers bettered his own old record in the 60 metre hurdles event. Last year he ran that distance in 13.3 seconds; this year he made it in 11.5.

Lumbers also set a new mark in the 60 metre run with a time of 8.7 he beat Jim Allonby's '74 record of 9.5.

Brent Vickery tied the 8.20 metre mark set by Martin Collerton last year in the shot put.

In the senior girls events, Beth Scott felled two of Michelle Field's records set from last year. In the 80 metre hurdles Beth shaved point one seconds from the mark. She ran the distance in 16.3 seconds.

Beth's time of 1:15.4 seconds in the 400 metre run was better than Michelle's 1:13.

Also on the senior level, Kim Barber's loss of 8:80 metres beat Debbie Spence's

mark of 8:49 which was set in 1975.

Janet Ager set the only new mark in the intermediate girls events. She ran the 100 metres in 15.5 seconds which beat out Debbie Turkosz' 15.7.

Mardie Phillips and Susan Kinal, in the junior girls' events, tied a two year old record set by Micky Phillips in the 60 metres. The record, which all three hold, is 9.2 seconds.

Susan set a new mark of 13.8 seconds in the 60 metre hurdles. The old mark was set by Lorianne Cook last year—it was 14 seconds flat.

Sharon Turkosz' toss of eight metres in the shot put dropped Margaret Macdonald's '74 mark of seven metres.

Speedy Nelson wins 6th Peel-Halton title

Nelson High School from Burlington easily won its sixth consecutive Peel-Halton high school track and field championship at Etobicoke's Centennial Stadium last Wednesday, leaving its competition far behind with 300 points.

Brampton Centennial was second with 197 points, Bramalea Secondary third with 167, and Lorne Park fourth with 152. Acton High School finished 29th in a field of 32 schools with 18 points, one behind Milton District.

None of the Acton athletes who went to the Peel-Halton championships qualified for the Ontario finals (OFSSA) to be held this weekend at Centennial Stadium.

Seven Acton students placed in the top six spots in their events, but only first place winners and those who finished second but surpassed OFSSA standards are eligible for the Ontario finals.

Lynn Margetts finished fourth in the midget javelin with a throw of 24.53 metres, behind Diane Jones of Kennedy who set a meet record of 28.15 metres.

In the senior girls class, Kim van der Eyken took fourth place in the shot put with a distance of 9.47 metres.

Anne Smith, a senior, came within five centimetres of an OFSSA berth in the high jump with a leap of 1.52 metres. She tied with two others for third place, but wound up fifth on the basis of fewer misses. P. White of Brampton won the event with a 1.57 metre jump.

Discus Pat Nessett was the other girl to finish in the top six, as she was sixth in the midget

North-Eastern's team, the Huskies, play in division one of the East Coast Athletic Conference (ECAC). Harvard and Boston University are also members of the conference.

The 17-year old rear-guard starts school this fall. Mr. Caputo was awarded the OHA Junior "C" Sabres' President's Trophy as the team's best defenceman.

Mr. Caputo finished his one Sabre season with eight goals and 20 assists. He played minor hockey in the Milton system.

Wire masks, ice time AMHA subjects

The annual meeting of the executive of the Acton Minor Hockey Association unanimously passed a motion to have all Waterloo-Wellington players wear wire face masks.

The mask covers the entire face and fits on the helmets used in the league, Frank Allsop AMHA president said.

The executive discussed several items, and decided not to have a survey of parents on the effect of teaching hockey on their children. The association may have the survey next year, Mr. Allsop said.

The question of ice time was tossed about for the longest of any topic. "We hope to

have what we had last year, plus some extra", Mr. Allsop said. Last season an ice surface had to be shared by two teams for practices, he said.

With the increase in costs charged by the town for ice, Mr. Allsop said there will definitely be an increase in registration fees next year. The rates will be set later this year.

Last season the association's time cost about \$5,300, while the budget covered \$3,000. The deficit is \$2,300.

Last season the cost per player in the atom section was \$32.50 to the association for ice time. Fourteen atom

players worked out for forty and a half hours (not counting away games, tournaments or exhibition games). The total cost for the ice to the AMHA was \$445. The figures come from Mr. Allsop.

It cost the association \$43.75 per player to ice each of the Firefighter Bants last season. The 16 players, used 51 and a half hours of ice time which totalled \$700.
