The lot levy on a single family home in Halton Hills urban area could jump from its present \$1450 to \$2050, if council endorses a planning

board recommendation. To plug the gap left by Halton Region turning the collection of the \$600 lot levy for water and sewers over to the municipalities. Morrow came up with a \$1200 amount instead of the existing \$600 for water and sewer. The present Halton Hills levy is \$850 and the Region levy was \$600. Morrow's plan would up the total levy for a single family

home by \$600. Morrow said the town had to stay competitive on lot levies. He claimed the burden of capital costs is higher added to the present taxpayer or added to the cost of the house for the new home

Councillor Les Duby contended the amount of lot levies should be justified.






