Most people don't even realize they have a septic system until the first time it cops out.

Let there be water

Rural water and disposal systems have to be treated with loving care and tact. A good well can produce unlimited pure water as long as it is a considerable distance from the waste Mr. and Mrs. Brian Fuller weeping bed. The well we have in this house is a bored well divined by a local diviner, who did an excellent job. As predicted, we have enough water from that well to flood the township.
