Bow hunting allowed for deer this year

Halton Region will be open to deer hunters this year as opposed to last when no deer hunting was allowed.

The season in Halton and neighboring regions of Hamilton-Wentworth, Peel and York will be from October 25 to Nov. 30.

There is a restriction however, hunting will be limited to bows and arrows, and no dogs are allowed. The Ministry of Natural Resources has

opened this closed area because of an increase in the local deer population. Similarly, in other parts of the province deer season has been altered to reflect the size of the herd.

Deer hunting in the four regions is limited to residents only. The closest area which permits non-residents hunting with guns and dogs is the Bruce Peninsula, which is open from Nov. 7 to Nov. 30. The area around Huntsville is open from Nov. 1 to Nov. 6. A complete season list can be obtained from the Ministry.

The combined cost of tennis courts in the Moore Park area and Acton was over budget by \$1400. Treasurer Ray King told Halton Hills finance committee, Monday night.

The \$1400 will be covered by a \$2,000 surplus in the Acton swimming pool fund, according to the finance committee recommendation.

Sports eligibility rule not changed by board

Halton Board of Education decided Thursday it won't try and interfere with eligibility rules set down by the Halton Secondary School Athletic Association.

A report was filed with the board in response to concerns expressed last month by Trustee Ernie Bodnar and complaints from Georgetown resident John Ferguson with respect to students playing in municipal soccer leagues not being able to play for their schools.

Boich explained there are restrictions governing who can play for school teams at

the Halton, Halton-Peel and Ontario levels.

He said some people believe there should be no restrictions while others, including Halton officials, think there should be some restrictions imposed on those who play for municipal representative teams.

Boich explained by not permitting students who play for community teams to play for the school, more youngsters are then able to participate. He added there is often a conflict of commitment for the student between school and community teams.

He said the board administration has long felt since most of the work done by educators with respect to athletics is voluntary and takes up a lot of time, then the board shouldn't interfere with its operations.

Board chairman Judy Alexander, Trustees Bill Priestner, Bill Herd and Jim Clelland all voiced support for the Halton Secondary School Athletic Association's position on player eligibility.

Bodnar said there is very little overlap in the high school and Georgetown soccer seasons and noted some students who are members of school track and field teams are also members of track and field clubs.

He said the same rules which are applied to sports in Halton could therefore be applied to such things as music and school bands, too.

Taylor's version of what followed goes like this: "I waved at the ref for an assist. Then I thought about a goal and asked, 'How about the goal, ref?' The ref (unidentified) said 'OK'."

Taylor's goal gave Rams a 2-1 lead over the Satellites at

the 3:30 mark of the first period. Owen Sound, however, won the game 2-1.

Taylor's one goal and 19 assists keeps him in fourth spot in the Ram scorers.

Taylor says he had three goals while playing for East York.

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IMPORTANT CHANGES TO RENT REVIEW LEGISLATION

EFFECTIVE MAY 21ST, 1976

Residential premises: Where the rent for residential premises has been increased by up to eight per cent since January 1, 1976 and rent review proceedings have not been initiated, no further increase in rent for the premises can be made for a period of 12 months from the date of the last previous rent increase.

Mobile homes: Sites in a mobile home park or mobile homes not previously rented for residential purposes prior to January 1, 1976 are exempt from the Residential Premises Rent Review Act.

Periodic tenancies: It is confirmed that the Act applies to periodic tenancies (for example, rental units which are leased for weekly or monthly periods), regardless of whether the lease is written, oral or implied.

Public hospitals and religious institutions: Rental premises owned or operated by a religious institution for a charitable use on a non-profit basis are exempt from rent review. Public hospitals are also exempt.

Federal, Provincial and Municipal Government rental premises: Rental premises owned or operated by federal, provincial or municipal governments, or their agencies, on a rent geared-to-income or limited dividend basis are exempt from rent review. However, privately-owned and operated limited dividend premises remain subject to rent review.

Educational institutions: Also exempt are non-profit educational institutions which provide accommodation for students or staff. However, where there exists a recognized student council or staff association, the institution must consult with them before a notice of a rent increase is given, otherwise this exemption does not apply. A statement certifying that there has been consultation must be filed with the local rent review officer by the institution.

If a landlord has failed to refund to a tenant a rent rebate ordered by a rent review officer or the Residential Premises Rent Review Board, the tenant is entitled to deduct, from as many rent payments as are required, the amount required to recover the rebate order.

Please note a new Application for Rent Review (Form 5A) is now in use for applications for rent review for tenancy agreements which take effect or are renewed at any time during the period from August 1, 1976 to July 31, 1977.
