Music was piped into the gym, adding the the excitement while the students worked on demonstrations or sold handmade crafts. A steady stream of people went through the show on Thursday evening and Friday, according to art teacher Mrs. June Levy, with draws for prizes being made at regular intervals.

All day Friday, students from the various art periods had a sidewalk coloring contest outside the school. Chalk drawings on concrete covered the sidewalk at the entrance outside the gym and on down toward the main entrance. A few drawings made their way onto Acton Boulevard. Principal Dean Fink and Director of Education, L. M. Lavender judged the artists' works and called a tie between Susan Mellor and Dan

The visitors, according to Mrs. Levy, were impressed by the organization of the event and the way the students were able to work together. She said that many parents made comments about the pottery wheel expressing surprise of its existance. Mrs. Levy said the objective of the art show was to show the public what the school offers and the talents which are hidden within the




