

Eager to learn job as rec. co-ordinator

Anne Pickering admits she has a lot to learn with her new job as wards one and two recreation co-ordinator, but she is looking forward to the challenges, and the changes.

Miss Pickering took over her new post on Monday, after the former co-ordinator, John Cooper, took a similar job with the city of Brampton. She is not new to Acton as she has been the pool supervisor since its opening in November of 1974. The new co-ordinator was in charge of programs, lessons and all other aspects of aquatics.

One drawback of working at the pool, she says, was the limited variety of people she met. Miss Pickering said the people she met were always tied to swimming. She is looking forward to meeting people in areas other than aquatics although she will miss the pool and its people.

The 24-year-old Burlington native has her Bachelor of Science degree in Human

Kinetics from the University of Guelph. Miss Pickering is at present living in Guelph, but she plans to move in here in the fall.

Right now, Miss Pickering says there are many of her jobs she is not aware of, but does not expect it will take very long before she is aware of all the aspects of recreation for her area.

As wards one and two co-ordinator, she is responsible for Acton and Esquesing. Geographically, her area is large as it covers everything from Speyside, to Norval, to Glen Williams, and all the other small communities.

In the meantime, the swimming pool is without a supervisor until one is hired. Cathy Ashley who has been Miss Pickering's assistant in her old job will be acting supervisor until a more permanent arrangement can be made. Miss Pickering will still oversee all Miss Ashley's jobs.

The new co-ordinator will have a lot more stable hours with her job. Working at the pool her day started around four and went to 11 p.m. Now, she will start her day at 8.30 a.m. and finish at 4.30 p.m. Miss Pickering emphasized that she still has to attend meetings after her regular day of work.

The Acton and Esquesing Recreation Advisory Committee will meet with Miss Pickering twice a month, as they did with Mr. Cooper. Halton Hills General Administration Committee meetings are attended frequently by the co-ordinator as are recreation department meetings. Groups organizing clubs

or recreation programs of their own often ask the co-ordinator to be present at their meetings for advice and guidance.

Miss Pickering wants to learn her job, and learn it well. She is located in the municipal offices on Mill St., amidst piles of paperwork, files and recreation programs. She is looking forward to meeting people around town and doing a good job at developing and administering recreation programs, assisting community groups and acting as a liaison between these groups and the recreation department. She is also in charge of booking community centres and Board of Education facilities.
