Police Chief is scared

Something must be wrong when the chief of police admits he is scared—not just worried but scared—about the state of society.

Halton police chief Ken Skerrett told a Burlington audience last week "I'm beginning to get frightened."

Although Skerrett blames some specific problems on government, especially Ottawa, he takes a general swing at society in general, reaching even the homes of Halton.

He assails parents for not properly rearing their young, and the community for not taking care of its own.

For too long people have looked outside themselves to fix blame and seek solutions to society's problems.

The result is that Skerrett and the men of his department are being asked to take on an astronomical number of duties in a community in which people refuse to take any action themselves.

It's true that all sorts of factors (including senseless government legislation which Skerrett bitterly condemns) contribute to this world's woes.

But the crutch of fobbing off responsibility for problems and their solutions to others has been allowed to continue too long.

Skerrett's call last week was clearly to each member of society to accept his or her public duty.

When a community, or nation, refuses to accept reality and continues to withdraw into a shell—feebly moaning something about it being the other person's fault, that experts will find a cure—something is indeed wrong.

Separate school taxes up over \$30

Halton Hills separate school supporters face tax hikes of between \$31 and \$33 following ratification of a \$9.4 million budget by Halton Roman Catholic Separate School Board last week.

This year's budget is up 23 per cent over last year's which was \$7.6 million. Actually the board spent \$7.9 million last

year, board business administrator Tom Brady reported.

Acton and Georgetown separate school supporters will pay approximately \$31 while Esquimes supporters will fork over \$33 more this year than last year.

The mill rate took its largest jump in Esquimes where it went up 5.42 mills. In Acton the mill rate climbed 5.26 mills and in Georgetown it jumped 4.22 mills.

Wages form the largest part of the budget because of the 24 per cent pay boost teachers won this year after negotiations with the board and subsequent decision by the Anti-Inflation Board.

Unlike the Halton Board of Education the separate school board has budgeted a 10 per cent raise, the most the teachers can get under the wage guidelines, for the last four months of this year. The public school budget didn't reflect any raise for the teachers between September and the start of 1977.

The board decided to spend money to send 237 students to separate schools in Hamilton and Peel-Dufferin for grades nine and ten this year. The cost of building a separate high school, \$86,000, was not included in this year's budget. A separate high school is expected to be built in Burlington.

Grade nine classes are planned for 1977 and grade 10 in 1978. There is a possibility grades 11, 12 and 13 may eventually be offered.

In line with restraints, the board has not expanded any of its programs and hasn't increased library of school supply expenditures.

Expenses for trustees attending conferences and conventions have been sliced in half.

Brady said the mill rate hike for separate school supporters was approximately equal to that of elementary public school supporters.
