

Present awards, diplomas to first 4-H Carnegie grads

Forty-three members of Halton 4-H clubs received diplomas from the Dale Carnegie Personal Development Program during an award ceremony held at Holy Rosary Church Hall Saturday night.

They are the first 4-H class ever to receive this training in Canada.

Theresa Holland, area Dale Carnegie course supervisor and 4-H course instructor, said she was pleased with the mature attitude of the Halton 4-H'ers.

"Even their parents have noticed a change in them," Mrs. Holland said. "I think each one of the students has benefited from the course."

Mrs. Holland said the key to the course is "personal development" and that the goals of the course are building self-confidence and

Among the first decisions to be made by the 4-H class was who should receive the top awards - namely the Highest Achievement and Special Achievement Awards.

The class voted on the person they felt had gained the most from taking the course and came up with a winner from Georgetown and one from Milton.

Doug McPhail of RR2 Georgetown was chosen for the Highest Achievement Award and Donna Stewart of Milton received the Special Achievement Award.

Each Halton 4-H'er was required to attend 14 four hour sessions in order to qualify for a diploma.

As the 4-H class was such a success, Mrs. Holland said she is planning to form a new class in Milton for the summer months.

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Dump on Region's agenda for today

Members of the Tremaine-Britannia Citizens' Group will be out in force again today (Wednesday) when the subject of the proposed landfill site is discussed at a regular meeting of the Halton Regional Council.

The Public Works Committee will ask council to continue drilling and investigation at the Britannia Rd.-Tremaine Rd. site "F" once again. Council ordered a halt on that work during the last meeting, in favor of getting more information on the possibilities of expanding the current Burlington landfill site.

Hold up

The public works committee argues that the information on the Burlington site can be obtained concurrently with work on site F. Council rejected that stand earlier this month after a presentation by the citizens' group.

Anne Katz, one of the executive members of the citizens' group, claims the movement and protest is gaining

momentum day by day. She claims not just area residents but others outside the area have shown interest and support for the cause the group is fighting.

Mrs. Katz points to a \$100 donation from a townhouse owner in Milton, alarm expressed by Burlington residents and the pledged moral and financial support from the Halton Federation of Agriculture as examples of wide spread support.

The group has engaged environmental lawyer David Estrin to assist in the campaign against a landfill site in the area.

He assists in strategy, politics and public relations aspects of the campaign.
