# Plaque, maple tree marks wartime site

A happy trip back to England to visit relatives came to an end Saturday when Mr. and Mrs. John Post, Frederick St., returned home to Acton. They spent most of their time in their native land at Crawley and Worthing, and enjoyed the flights on the Boeing 747 very much.

At Brighton on June 12 Mr. Post spotted a Rolls Royce with the diplomatic license plate CDI behind the chauffeur Mr. Post thinks he saw the Hon. Paul Martin, the High Commissioner for Canada.

Mr. Post read in the local newspaper, the West Sussex Gazette and South of England Advertiser, an account of Mr. Martin's participation in a special Canadian ceremony, and Mr. Post brought the paper to the Free Press since he knew many others here would be interested.

Under the headline Canadians Pay a Welcome Visit is the following story.

"Veterans of the Canadian forces made a sentimental journey with their families on Sunday to Hawkhurst Court, a boys' preparatory school near Petworth, which they knew 34 summers ago as the headquarters of the second division of the Canadian Army.

"This was the setting for the planning and mounting of their divisional operation as part of the Dieppe raid on August 19, 1942.

"Near the hatted classrooms where Canadian soldiers had lived the 85 representatives from all eight branches of the Canadian Veterans Association in the United Kingdom paraded with their standards.

"Senior among them was 83-year-old ex-cavalryman Jack Cusack, the only Canadian Chelsea pensioner.

"They welcomed the High Commissioner for Canada (Hon. Paul Martin) who unveiled a commemorative plaque and marked the occasion by planting a Canadian maple tree.

"Mr. Martin told more than 150 boys and other guests at the ceremony that Dieppe must be a remote concept to

them.

"It was, however, a vitally important part of the war in which many like the Canadian veterans fought the forces that would have denied freedom for all time.

"These men fought so that people of all countries, and cultures could combine, without destroying their national personalities, in the pursuit of peace in the world.

"The headmaster (Mr. Richard Crossley-Holland) said the school was privileged to be able to pay respect to

Canadians who sacrificed their lives in the war, especially those in the Dieppe raid.

"The memorial was dedicated by the Vicar of Wisborough Green (the Rev. John Penney) and the blessing was by the Rural Dean of Petworth (the Rev. John Greene).

"Petworth Town Band and Horsham Sea Cadet Corps took part in the ceremony, which was followed by refreshments and an afternoon of games."
