A report was submitted to Halton Board of Education Thursday, by a committee of teachers in response to concerns expressed in February by Bodnar that Halton students weren't learning enough about the free enterprise system and democracy. Democratic principles and

the free enterprise system comprise at least 60 per cent of the content of programs like consumer studies, economics, history, law, people and politics, commercial subjects and marketing and retail merchandising, the report said.

Business education stresses the value of the free enterprise system, the desirability of compelition, risktaking and competition.

The report stated 53 per cent of all Halton high school students took at least one course emphasizing the free enterprise system and demo-

Bodnar wanted to know if there was one single course offered in Halton which answers the basic questions of the free enterprise system of how much is produced, who produces, what is produced and how it is distributed. He added he wanted to know what course compares all types of economic systems and how they deal with the basic questions.




