

Station, Electric topple Van's vaults into first

Station Hotel and Halton Hills Electric, in the Acton Men's Softball Association, hit the dust with their first losses of the season and slipped from first place Sunday afternoon.

Van's Welding with ten points holds a slender one point lead over both former first place clubs.

Halton Hills Catering and Ledgers IGA are tied in third spot with six points each. Family Cleaners, which has yet to earn a point this season, came close against Catering.

Vans clobbered the electricians 22-6, IGA took Station

16-7 and Catering edged Family 6-5.

Froze Van's hurler Art Lee froze the electrical batters out of three innings while fellow batters lined up an impressive series of hits for 22 runs.

Gene Yaworsky scored the winning hit in the third inning for Van's, one of his three for the game. Pitcher Lee, Larry Kistener, second baseman Jim McNabb and Chris Tennent also brought home a trio of runs.

Acton racers clinch firsts in swim meet

Acton swimmers clinched five firsts here during a rematch between Orangeville and Halton Hills, but the visitors won the final meet of the winter season by 80 points on June 19.

Orangeville took its second meet with 255 points while Recreation Department swimmers from here and Georgetown rolled up 175 points. Orangeville beat local swimmers in its home pool on May 29.

Mark Bray, in the age nine and ten class, came first in backstroke and free style races, and second in the butterfly. His winning times were 46.8 and 38.0 seconds respectively.

In the 11s and 12s' class, Julia Mullins also swept two firsts. She won the breast stroke in 48.5 and the individual medley in 1:43.3. She also came second in the backstroke, butterfly and free style races.

Acton swimmer Dave Hannah came first in the breast stroke event with a time of 1:32.5. In the butterfly, Mr. Hannah took second spot in the 15 and over class.

Second place swimmers include Dave Pendergast in the free style and breast stroke for 15 year olds and older. John Vadeika in the 9s and 10s in the breast stroke, and Wendy Geberlein in the 15 and over group in the individual medley.

Miss Geberlein also collected three third place finishes in the breast stroke, butterfly and free style races.

In the 13 to 14 year old class Debbie Geberlein swam to a pair of third place finishes, while Chris Conneroy also got a third in the boys' race for the same age group in breast stroke.

The Halton Hills swimmers won the medley relay in the 9s and 10s' class, but Orangeville took the races in the upper age groups.

In over-all individual performances Georgetown's eight year old and under wonder Teresa Pollitt took first place in four races: butterfly, backstroke, breast stroke and free style.

Two Orangeville swimmers—John Matthews (11s and 12s) and Kathy Moran in the 15s and over—raced to five firsts.
